MERCHANT OF VENICE WAS ABLY PRESENTED

By the Seniors Last Evening--A Crowded House Listened to Modernized Classic

The Merchant of Venice is now a thing of the past, and the seniors can look back on last evening's performance and truly say, "Well done". With out a hitch or break the play moved smoothly and in every act the student actors did credit to themselves.

While the plot is not heavy, it occasion ally quotes from the original play. Substituted for the three caskets, were 30 many tin cash boxes and in place of the three thousand ducats, Bassanio borrows a "Pony", that he might pass the examinations required to win Portia. Antonio, represented as a football captain comes to the rescue and offers in place of a pound of flesh a pound of his nearest his brain. Of course Bassanio loses his forfeit the gaurantee, and vengeful Shylock tries to "hain his hat". In the last act, every thing comes out right and Shylock meets his just deserts.

Vern Hendricks as Shylock, and leading man carried his important part well and during the examination scene, caused shouts of laughter.

Miss Naomi Williamson as Portia, the wise and beautiful old her lines in a satisfactory manner, and especially so in the court scene where she did some real acting.

Archie Bay as Lancelotto, was the favorite of the evening. His part, that of a clown and court jester, was full of humor, and Archie certainly interpreted all the fun there was in it. His acting drew forth repeated applause. He made good work of the first line and continued to keep the large crowd in good spirits whenever he appeared.

Antonio, who did the best and pledged his pound of hair for his ultimate friend, was very ably portrayed by Roy Goodnough. Roy has been ill and just recovered sufficiently to be up, but for all that did credit to his lines. Jay Reynolds had the heaviest part in

the play, and handled it exceptionally well. With the one exception that he articulated indistinctly, there could be nothing but praise for him.

Miss Maude Cotner captured the house with period interpretation of Jessica. Grace Hopper was well received in her part of Nerissa.

While there were several minor characters in the play, all were ably filled. Miss Elizabeth Bunnell excelled as teacher and from indications last evening she will make the best sort of teacher, should she follow that vocation. Miss Elizabeth King as Polly the maid, and Miss Zora Lane as the fool's mother were perfectly carried. Edward Carling as a Duke was satisfactory. Miss Lottie Howard acted the loving mother to perfection. With a little more avoidance Dan Scott would make a real policeman. He did his "Copact" well. Tuba the porter and his attendant, were good. Carl Gilliam was perhaps the best looking artist among the minor characters, and his part of despoiling of much-clothed, old Phoebe only and a few lines, but did what little he had, well.

The speaking was very interesting. Graver Melville in his chair talk, showed himself a laughing art, both with tongue and organ. Miss Naomi Williamson made a hit with her feignation, and "tragedy". Guss Gross was unfortunate by having a misunderstanding with the program. When he did get started he sang a catchy song in a catchy way, and responded to an encore with a droll dance. Misses Grace Hopper and Nellie Murton rendered a duet, and a piano solo by Miss Florence McColl completed the specialties.

It was without a doubt the most satisfactory class affair seen here in years. The smoothness with which the play went off, showed that much hard work and preparation, had been done on the play.
