Visitors from all parts of Europe are arriving here with every rain and the hotels are rapidly becoming crowded. It is expected that in a day or two accommodations in the hotel will be at a primium and the prices are already assuming unusual proportious The police department is kept busy watching the arrivals and preserving order and the task will become more difficult from day to day. Extensive precautions are by take 1 to prevent hostile demonstra-tions by Republicans and Anarchists and strong guard will surround the King and the Princess at all times.
