UNION MEETING

The Union meeting held last night at the Presbyterian church was well attended. Rev. Paul Rader, of the Anti-Saloon League was to have addressed the meeting but did not arrive in the city, consequently Reverends Hayes, King, Gibson and Gibbs took charge of the meeting. Rev. Gibson delivering the principal address and showed up the temperance side of the question with reference to the local option law to be voted upon at the June election, which if passed will leave the temperance laws in the state in a much worse shape than they were prior to the adoption of the present law. Among other things the speaker criticized the undue manner in which the saloon interests have been able to place the wording on the ballot, which reads "For amendment to the local option law, giving anti prohibitionists and prohibitionists equal privileges" wherein as a matter of fact the full tact of the law practically wipes out the present law.
