**TO MERGE FOUR COPPER MINES**

Calumet, Mich., May 29.—It has just been authoritatively announced that a gigantic merger, to include four large Arizona copper mines controlled by Calumet, Duluth and Pittsburg capitalists is soon to be made. It is proposed to organize a new corporation with 20,000,000 capital to take over the Calumet and Pittsburg Lake Superior and Pittsburg Junction and Duluth Mining companies, operating the Bisbee, Ariz. mines. These concerns are controlled by Charles Briggs James and Thomas Hoatson, of Calumet and Thomas F. Cole and associates of Duluth. Nearly every man prominent in the United States Steel Corporation is heavily interested. The deal will result in one of the largest copper mining corporations in the world.

**LOSS TO SOUTH BAY FISHERS**

**OSTEOPATHY FOR THE EYES**

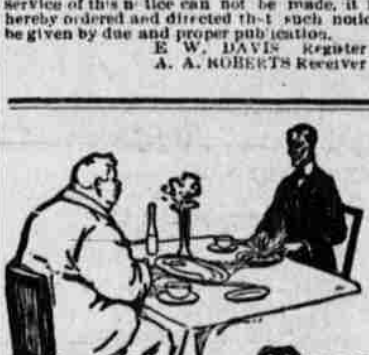
