Philadelphia, Pa., May 31.—The first State Convention of the Lincoln Party met at Musical Fund Hall this forenoon to perfect its arrangements for the coming campaign and to nominate a state ticket. The convention has been set one week ahead of the date of the Republican convention for the double purpose of giving expression to the desire of the new party to preserve its independence from any Republican influence and to force the Republicans, if possible, to endorse the candidates selected by the Lincoln party.
