In pursuance of the proclamation of the President of the United States, dated March 15, 1906, excluding from the former Baker City Forest Reserve, partly embraced in the Blue Mountains Forest Reserve, Oregon, the area described below, and restoring to settlement the public lands therein, notice is hereby given that the said public lands will become subject to entry, filing and selection under the usual restrictions, at the United States Land Office at La Grande, Oregon, on July 18, 1905: (1) Township eight (8) South, Range thirty-eight (38) East, Willamette Meridian, the west half of the north-west quarter and the west half of the south-west quarter of Section thirty-five (35); in Township nine (9) South, Range thirty-nine (39) East, the west half of the north-west quarter and the west half of the south-west quarter of Section twenty-nine (29), and the west half of the north-west quarter of Section thirty-two (32). RESOLUTION

BE IT RESOLVED: That the city Recorder of the city of La Grande, be and is hereby directed to give notice to the abutting property owners on the east side of 7th street, between its intersections with M and P streets, for the construction of a side walk abutting the premises, and a like notice to the abutting property owners on both sides of Depot street, from its intersection of Jefferson avenue, to its intersection of Fourth street and Adams avenue, from its intersection with Fourth Street, to its intersection of Fir street: That an ordinance for the improvement of said street and avenue will be proposed at the next regular meeting of this Council, for the improvement of said street and avenue, by putting the same upon the established grade therefore, and paving the same with crushed rock or gravel. TO THE VOTING PUBLIC

The article in yesterday's Observer, reflecting on J. R. Oliver by the cowardly method of indirection and innuendo, calls for a short reply, but Mr. Oliver is in the north end of the county and will not be back before Saturday and probably has not seen the article referred to. This makes it necessary for me to reply. The article in question is an appeal to prejudice and is intended to give the voter a false idea about Mr. Oliver, who is a candidate for County Judge. I was surprised to see such a thing in the same issue of a paper which contained an editorial on the filthy habit of a muck-raker. In business, I have always found Mr. Henry a gentleman and it is hard to believe that he would stoop to such methods as these on the eve of the election and too late to get a reply in any other paper except the Daily Observer, which has kindly consented to publish this. I was County Clerk from 1890 to 1894 under the old fee system, during which time the county paid me for all services rendered according to a schedule of fees fixed by the Legislature. The county paid no other person connected with the Clerk's office a cent and I paid of my fees for all deputies and clerical work in the office, and I never have heard from any source any complaint that the work was not well done, nor any suspicion that any illegal fees were charged. I do not now know how much these fees aggregated and would not attempt to guess, lest I be as wide of the mark as the article in yesterday's paper, but it would be as far from the truth to say that the aggregate fees were profit as it would be to say that Mr. Henry's magnificent business in the La Grande is worth \$75,000 or \$80,000 a year because he takes in that much money on the year's business. His expenses must be paid. J. R. Oliver was elected County Clerk in 1894 and served four years, and at that time the office was on the same salary that it is now, \$1800.00 a year, and the County paid separately the deputies and clerical work in the office. The county paid no fees and Mrs. J. R. Oliver was never on the payroll in her life, neither was Charlie Oliver ever a deputy. But why reply to all this "rot" which has no possible bearing upon the issue in this campaign and is appropriate only to the knight of the muck-rake who furnished the stuff. The article referred to says, "Now Jack does not really care so much for the office, which only pays \$1200.00 per year, as for the opportunity to get his abstract office in the court house" In no event could he have an abstract office in the court house because the business is down town and why should he care less for the \$1200.00 a year than Mr. Henry Mr. Henry could not move his undertaking business into the court house, and it is just as absurd to suppose that the abstract business could be moved there. But the paid for article finds the best "mare's nest" in the insinuation that the shrewd and cunning people of Union are striving to buy the old court house at a low price so that they can turn it over free to the proposed new County. Now isn't that a corker! Any school boy knows that if a new County were set off out of a part of the territory of Union County all public property within the limits of the new county will belong to that by virtue of the law and without any purchase being made, and does the author of the muck-rate article suppose for a moment that the people of Union are so silly, so wanting in business sense, that they would devise some shrewd scheme to purchase something which they would get without price by virtue of the act creating a new county? Even a wellfaring man, though a County Judge should know more than that. The solid, unvarnished truth is that all the property J. R. Oliver owns is invested in his abstracts which have cost him about \$10,000, on which he owes some \$3,000.00 The value of this property depends upon the amount of business he can do. The larger and

more populous the county the larger a d better the business. Before the "Panhandle" was cut off and annexed to Baker county he was doing an excellent business, but that act cut off one third of his business, transferring the same to Baker county. Another division of the county would ruin his business entirely, and the money invested in the abstracts would be practically a complete loss. No insinuations that can be made can have any weight as against this lot of facts. But since this bundle of insinuations Mr. Henry was mayor of the city of La Grande from March, 1902, to March, 1903. During that year the record shows that three regular meetings of the council were held at which business was transacted. Two adjourned meetings were held and all the rest of the business for the year was done at special meetings called by the mayor for a special purpose, at which no business could be transacted except that for which the meeting was called. It was currently reported at that time that no meeting of the council could be held except when Mr. Scriber wanted a meeting, and that whenever Mr. Scriber did not want a meeting, no quorum was present. It was a source of frequent remark that Mr. Scriber was managing the mayor and the city government, and that no measure could go through the council which did not have his approval. As to whether Mr. Scriber was managing the affairs pro bono publico or pro bono Scriber, the public undoubtedly has its opinion. When B. F. Wilson was county judge, Mr. Scriber had a proposition before the county court to refund the indebtedness of Union county by calling in and cancelling all outstanding county warrants and issuing new warrants, coupons principal and interest, with coupons attached providing for the payment of the interest annually out of a special tax to be levied for that purpose by the county court. Scriber wanted to handle these warrants and evidently had golden visions regarding this business, but he could not work Judge Wilson to approve his scheme. Mr. Scriber worked very hard for Mr. Henry's nomination and is working very hard now for his election. The voters must decide the question as to whether it would be to the best interests of Union county to elect him or to elect J. R. Oliver for county judge. After all is said, this is the only question for the voters to decide. If the voter thinks that Mr. Oliver's past record as a public officer, his long experience with county affairs, and his well known integrity, give him special qualifications for the position,
