

SEVERAL SALOONS TO CLOSE

 Sacramento, June 6—State Superintendent Tenner of the Anti-saloon League went to lone today for the purpose of causing the arrest of five saloon keepers charged with violating the law regarding the selling of liquor within two miles of a state reformatory of penal institution. The saloon keepers are guilty of conducting saloons near the Preston School of Industry, a state institution. The law was passed by the last legislature and at the institution of the temperance people. If the law is upheld it will close five saloons at lone and nineteen near the Falsom penitentiary.

Judges of the contest were Professors Young, Shafer and Home. This year is the first time that the Bennett prize has been offered.

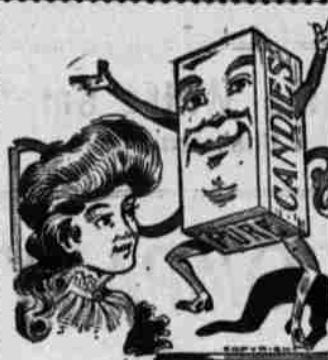
