BIG RAISE IN FIRE INSURANCE

Agent Wm. Miller, today received the following instructions from the Board of Fire Underwriters, which will make quite a difference in insurance rates everywhere on the Pacific coast. It seems after all the people will be called upon to pay the San Francisco losses. The instructions read as follows.

"Except as hereafter provided, the rates now applying within the jurisdiction of this Board, whether published or tariff, are hereby increased 25 per cent.

The rates so increased shall be maintained until after the application of a schedule based upon percentages of insurance to value and increasing present charges for improper construction, unprotected openings, hazardous occupancies, exposures and conflagration hazard.

Exceptions: The following classes of risks are not subject to above increase: Risks protected by sprinkler equipments approved by this Board, saw mills, not including lumber yards connected therewith, farm property, including growing grain, buildings and their contents occupied exclusively as dwellings, or their private barns, churches, school houses, and city, town or county public buildings."

KING OF ITALY IN DANGER
