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TO REVERSE THE BLOOD CIRCULATION

(Scripps News Association)

Chicago, Ill., June 8.—Dr. Alexis Carrel and Dr. C. C. Guthrie, who have for more than one year conducted a series of important experiments at the Hull Physiological Laboratory connected with University of Chicago. It is believed that these experiments have demonstrated the possibility of substituting veins for arteries and changing the whole circulation of the human body.

Diseases that have hitherto been incurable and others that have in general been fatal in a large majority of cases, it is believed, may be cured by the reversal of the blood. The experiments have, so far been conducted on dogs, but they have reached a stage where it is thought that the same test may safely be tried on human beings. The discoverers of this new method are confident of success and believe that it will revolutionize surgery.

SAVED BUILDING

Baton Rouge, La., June 8.—The state capital building was saved from destruction this morning when Governor Blanchard and a member of the legislature in their night clothes put out the fire. Defective wiring was the cause. The loss is estimated at \$8,000.

MALHEUR IS DRY

Malheur county carried for prohibition at the election Monday and now that county will be without saloons for at least two years. M. Jacobsgaard, formerly of Baker City but who has been engaged in the wholesale liquor business in Ontario for the past six months, is in Baker today. He says the vote for prohibition carried by an alarming majority, in that county, only three or four precincts in the entire county going wet.

This will put many saloons and wholesale houses in that county out of business. Mr. Jacobsgaard in discussing the situation said:

"The real cause of Malheur going for prohibition is the manner in which the saloons have been conducted. I believe a majority of the voters of Malheur are in favor of saloons if they are conducted along the proper lines. But in Malheur there was gambling and music and open towns and everything that the prohibitionists could object to in addition to the regular liquor business. The result was that the county went dry. And it may be some time before the people vote for saloons again."

PTOMAIN POISONING

Wooster, June 8.—Mary McKinley, of Boise, Idaho, is one of the eleven girls of Wooster University who are suffering from ptomaine poisoning. Two of the girls are said to be in a serious condition. They all attended a banquet last evening. Physicians are unable to account for the illness. The university authorities are silent thus far.

TWO MINERS KILLED

Indianapolis, June 8.—Two strikers were killed and six wounded at Ernest, a mining town, early today, when the miners clashed with the state constabulary. An unknown miner fired on a squad of constabulary, which returned the fire with the above results.

WET AND DRY COUNTIES IN OREGON

Portland, June 8.—As a result of the recent election two hundred saloons will be forced to close in the state of Oregon, through the adoption of county prohibition. The complete count shows that Benton, Linn, Lane, Tillamook, Wallowa, Malheur and Yamhill went "dry." Partial returns indicate the same results in Sherman, Gilliam, Lincoln and Crook counties. Coos county went dry except in the larger towns. Many precincts in wet counties were captured by the prohibitionists. The net loss to the liquor interests is estimated at \$750,000. The breweries are the heaviest losers. There were but two victories gained by the liquor interest and those were in Multnomah county.

Eight counties in Oregon "went dry" in the election last Monday, so far as returns are as yet available, and others are still to be heard from. The "dry" counties are: Benton, carried by 170 votes; Sherman by 179; Linn, by 450; Lane, by 350; Yamhill, by 260; Coos, by 100; Tillamook, by 100; and Wallowa, by a small margin.

Counties which rejected prohibition as a whole were Malheur, by a small plurality; Polk, by 269; Morrow, by 62; Wasco, by 150. By the terms of the local option law, under which the prohibition elections were held, a county which rejected prohibition as a whole receives prohibition in the precincts voting for it.

A very active campaign for prohibition was waged in the foregoing counties between the liquor forces on the one side and the prohibition forces on the other.

Exact figures of the pluralities of Monday's election will not be secured until the official canvass shall be made by the Secretary of the State on the returns from the several counties. These returns will not, however, change to any considerable degree the pluralities as they are already estimated.

Chamberlain's lead over Withycombe for Governor will probably be between 2500 and 2500, and that of Bourne over Gearin for United States Senator will fall slightly under 2500.

Women's suffrage was defeated by approximately 10,000, the local-option change by perhaps 9,000, and the Barlow road appropriation by about 7500. Multnomah County gave the Barlow bill 300 plurality, but the bill encountered heavy opposition in other counties, such as Clackamas, Marion, and Polk.

The referendum appropriation bill of the last Legislature, providing for state institutions, is sustained by perhaps 13,000. Majorities for all the other initiative measures will range from 18,000 to 30,000, the latter figures probably being attained by the majorities for the gross earnings tax bills, which received a larger vote than any of the bills in the election.

The majority for the anti-pass bill will exceed 20,000, and for the State Printer amendment 25,000.

Only partial returns have been secured from the counties on the amendments, but they are complete enough to show the trend of the majorities. — O

Washington, June 8.—Secretary of the Interior ordered the restoration to entry nine townships under the Silver Creek project, 500,000 acres under the Malheur project, nine townships under the Owyhee project, and seventeen townships under the Silver Lake project. NIGHT DECIDED FOR LENNY HIRY

Attorney Farrell for the defense challenged the entire special venire of seventy-five men on the ground that Sheriff Sibley, biased against the defendant has expressed opinion, but stated that he had not personally summoned the veniremen. The judge overruled the challenge and eight veniremen were accepted and sworn in.

HANGED PROTESTING INNOCENCE

RANGE WAR IN IDAHO

Grangeville Idaho.—Three hundred sheep belonging to J. Davis of Salmon river have been killed, presumably by cattlemen, near White Bird.

On Monday Davidson shot William Hahle, a cattleman, in a dispute over the building of a fence. There is a strong feeling between the cattlemen and sheep owners. The cattlemen are trying to compel the enforcement of the law prohibiting sheepmen from grazing their herds within two miles of any homestead.

SIGNED THE BILL

CIRCUIT COURT

The jury in the case of J. W. Scriber vs A. T. Hawett, brought in a verdict for the defendant. This was an action brought to recover on a note purported to have been given in payment for a life insurance policy. The defense pleaded the note was a forgery. Mr. Scriber purchased the note through commercial channels and as it has responsible endorsers, will recover from them.

In the case of the State vs Adolph Austin, of Telocasset, who raised an order from \$1.50 to \$10.50, he plead guilty and was sentenced to two years.

In the case of the State vs Fred Reynier, charged with assault, he plead guilty and was fined \$50.

LARGE APPROPRIATIONS

Ellen home for the feeble minded \$35,000 for the Agnes asylum and \$25,000 for the Ukiah home.

PACKERS BUY MANY FULL PAGES

Chicago, June 8.—It is estimated that the meat packers will be forced to spend not less than one million dollars to stem the tide of indignation aroused by the recent expense. The packers have already commenced the work of creating public opinions in their favor by the lavish expenditure of money with newspapers. Already fifty thousand dollars have been spent in this city for page advertisements inviting the public to visit the plants and examine conditions for themselves.

This morning advertisements appeared in many of the eastern papers. The packers have announced that they would not spend one dollar with local publications which made an attack upon them.

Washington, June 8.—The agricultural report of packing houses made on April 17 along the recommendation of Beveridge's amendment, contains clauses that are identical to the Neill-Reynolds report regarding the unsanitary conditions of closets.

Washington, June 8.—The President sent the House agricultural committee two reports of the inspection of the Chicago packing houses by the agricultural department, before the Neill-Reynolds. The President in a letter comments on the immediate extraordinary improvements in packing house conditions, following the Neill-Reynolds report.

The letter states that the investigation of the packing town was unfurnished and that he was not prepared to make a final statement regarding the complaint against the bureau of animal industry or the grave charges in connection with the adulteration of meat products as well as other matters. He quotes from a latter Chicago friend who describes the packers haste in cleaning up as "Amusing if it were not so highly tragic."

INSURANCE COMPANY FAILS

San Francisco June 8.—The local agent of the Eagle Insurance today issued a statement to the effect that the head office at New York that the company had canceled all existing policies in San Francisco. The company liabilities in San Francisco amount to \$673,244, and it is capitalized at \$500,000. The company has a good surplus of \$376,072. This is the first company to repudiate on account of disaster. It is feared that other companies will follow.
