(Scripps News Association) Chicago, Ill., June 9—A lake breeze has broken the hot wave that has claimed the lives of twelve people. Scores are in the hospitals suffering from heat prostrations and several more may die. The cooling winds from the lake has led the citizens to believe that cooler weather is coming tomorrow.

He wants to finish his work of placing the Philippines on a sound basis before he turns his attention to anything else. The Supreme court judgeship will not be decided upon until December.

OHIO MINES EMPLOY NON-UNION MEN

(Scripps News Association) Dillon, Va., June 9—The militia has been withdrawn today from the mining districts and the operators are employing guards. The mines will begin work next Monday with a force of non-union men. The authorities have come to the conclusion the mine owners should guard the mines at their own expense.

CALIFORNIA SOLONS ENACT AND PASS MANY BILLS

(Scripps News Association) Sacramento, June 9—In the face of a well merited rebuke, administered to the San Francisco delegation by Transus and Stanton, last night, for dilatory tactics and disposition to work a lot harder and longer in order that an adjournment may be had tonight, Atkinson was slow in calling the assembly to order this morning. The session convened a full three quarters hour after the time set. After two hours of the hardest sort of work the members were forced to admit that nothing short of a miracle would result in the desired end. Last night it was the general impression that it would be impossible to get through before Tuesday or Wednesday. After the usual preliminaries were out of the way, Atkinson raised a little fury by introducing a constitutional amendment providing that San Francisco may, within a period of two years, regulate and restrict the use of its streets and establishments, the maintenance and enjoyment of any privileges that it now enjoys. Representative Treadwell introduced a resolution where by the final passage of twenty-five bills among which was one appropriating half million dollars establishing buildings in San Francisco. After several objections the bunch of bills were finally passed.

In the meantime some of the affected vessels are coaling but no sailing dates are set, and every thing is quiet.

He will not discuss further than he has not been officially notified of the offer.

'VARSITY GETS A FORTUNE

(Scripps News Association) Fresno, Calif., June 9—It has just been announced that in accordance with the terms of the will of Theodore Kearney, a raisin grower of this district, who died suddenly a short time ago on the steamship Caronia bound from New York to Queenstown, his entire estate, valued at \$750,000 is bequeathed to the University of California for the establishment of a viticultural station at this place. The will provided that, in case of a contest the estate shall go to William Alvord who is dead, William H. Crocker, James D. Pheasant, and Joseph D. Grant. No statement has as yet been made whether the relatives of the testator intend to contest the will or not.
