

UNION COUNTY

We do not believe that there is another county in the Inland Empire that can show fourteen different industries whose total annual revenue produces an average of \$193,000.00 cash.

The annual report of the State labor Commissioner, places Union County third in the state, in the employment of labor.

It requires 194 solid trains of four tv cars each to carry the produce of our county to the market, more than a train ever other da throughout the ear.

"An admirable climate." The past winter only for a few hours did the mercury reach zero. No excessive heat in the summer and our cool refreshing nights cannot be appreciated by the residents of the east until they are permitted to enjoy them.

Our soil is rich and productive. Were we to mention yields they would not be believed. The only way to become acquainted with this "Garden of Eden" is to personally visit this land of diversity, as when you see the crops growing and harvested they speak for themselves.

Our forests will require many decades of the present activity before they begin to yield and we now have thirty or more saw mills which give employment the year round in the mills and logging camps.

The only sugar beet factory in the state is located at La Grande, the County Seat of Union County with a population of 5,000, progressive wide awake people who extend the glad hand to all. This is the commercial, educational and social center of the county.

La Grande is known as the railroad town of the O. R. & N. Co. whose annual payroll at this place exceeds \$500,000.00. From here the branch road is now pushing through the northern part of this county, on into the Walla Walla County, starts a freight division, machine shops, round houses, and one of the largest railroad yards on the system, and train dispatchers office. The public schools of La Grande are second to none in cities of this size in this state. We now have three buildings and a fourth, an eight room brick building in course of construction, giving employment to twenty-two teachers. The principal office of the Grande Ronde Electric Co. is located in this city. This Company furnishes power and light for the city of La Grande, Inland City, Cove, Union, and the Hot Lake Sanitorium.

ARMY TO HAVE OWN WIRELESS

(Scraps News Association)
Washington, D. C., June 9.—It has been decided that the army signal corps is to have its own wireless telegraph system.

There is an increasing call for this method of communication at the coast of 100,000 feet and it is found that the installation of such a complete system as that in the southern New York district would represent a great cost, for which the signal corps charged with the work of equipment does not possess the funds. The experts of the corps in Washington have decided to experiment with a new system buying the material in open market and assembling the parts to the end that they may have a means of wireless communication which shall answer the purpose of the coast artillery where it is used in sending messages between the target boats and the shore during the firing of heavy guns.

The system is to be of great value in that respect and the signal corps believe they can get up a system which will be as efficient as the best of the commercial systems which cost so much money. If the corps of engineers are successful this will mean a substantial loss of prospective business to the wireless telegraph companies which realized that wireless was to be extensively used along the coast in artillery communication.
