TO FORM MARKETING ASSOCIATION.

Chicago, Ill., June, 12.—Following the organization of the Michigan branch of the American Society of Equity a short time ago at Owosso, the national association called a meeting, which opens here today at the Great Northern Hotel, for the purpose of forming a Marketing Association. The new association is to be composed of farmers and its object is to market all kinds of perishable vegetables and fruits, as well as butter, eggs, poultry and all kinds of dairy products. Farmers of Michigan, Indiana, Illinois and other middle states are in attendance. It is proposed to control the supply of all products till the markets are ready for it and in this way bring to the producers all the benefits that are derived by others from storing vegetables, fruits, eggs and the like at a time of plenty and low prices for a time of scarcity and high prices. It is distinctly stated that the new organization is not to be a trust, but is simply to be organized for the purpose of eliminating the individual as a marketer of his products and market them through the association, though they may reach the consumer ultimately through the same channels as now.
