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**SLOCUM DISASTER MEMORIAL**

(Scripps News Association) New York, June 15—The anniversary of the Gen. Slocum disaster which occurred two years ago today, was observed in this city today in an impressive manner. Memorial services were held at St. Mark's Church in East Sixth Street and were attended by hundreds of people who had lost relatives in the catastrophe.

In the afternoon there will be exercises at the monument, which was erected last year over the graves of the unknown dead in the Lutheran Cemetery at Middle Village, L. I. The monument stands on St. Mark's Hill, one of the most commanding elevations in the cemetery grounds. It is expected that several thousand people will be present at the exercises. Several memorial addresses will be delivered.

The excursion steamer General Slocum having an excursion party of the Sunday School of St. Mark's Church, mostly women and children on board, caught fire while steaming up East River on June 15, 1904 and burned to the water's edge after being run into shallow water at North Brother Island. One thousand and thirty one persons were burned or drowned, while 266 persons were more or less severely injured. Capt. William H. Van Schaick, the master of the Gen. Slocum, the pilot, Frank A. Barnaby the President and several of the directors of the Knickerbocker Steamboat Company, Henry Lundbery, assistant local inspector of steamboats, and several others, in some way connected with the disaster were tried, but only Capt. Van Schaick was punished by being deprived of his license.

**UNION COUNTY**

We do not believe that there is another county in the Inland Empire that can show fourteen different industries whose total annual revenue produces an average of \$193,000.00 cash.

The annual report of the State labor Commissioner, places Union County third in the state, in the employment of labor.

It requires 194 solid trains of fourty cars each to carry the produce of our county to the market, more than a train ever other day throughout the year.

"An admirable climate." The past winter only for a few hours did the mercury reach zero. No excessive heat in the summer and our cool refreshing nights cannot be appreciated by the residents of the east until they are permitted to enjoy them.
