ARMY TRANSPORT SYSTEM

Washington, D. C. June.—The army quartermasters on duty here are elated over the results of the experiment which has been going on in transporting supplies without the aid of contractors. There has been considerable expense in transportation by contract. This work has been done after the public opening of bids, and it was found, that the service was not entirely satisfactory. In addition, the local teamsters entered into a combination by which they materially increased their prices for hauling of which the government does considerable between the railroad and the quartermaster's depot at Fort Myer, Virginia and other places of storage. As the quartermaster's depot was well supplied with wagons and horses and employed a number of men, it was decided to do away with contract transportation. The result has been eminently satisfactory. The work has been done more promptly, at a saving of money hitherto paid to the contractors and no additional cost for new wagons or horses or additional men.

The system will be permanently adopted and the War Department, in its local transportation, will hereafter be independent of contractors.

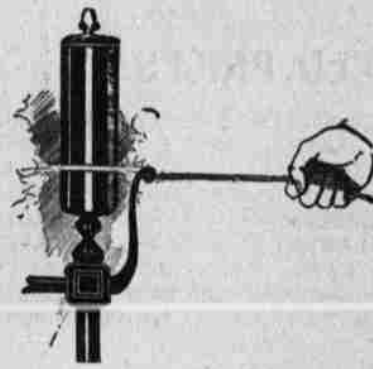
