SOME DETAILS OF WALLOWA MURDER

Last Monday evening in the town of Enterprise, about 7 o'clock, "Brick" Johnson, bartender at Fritz Ott's saloon, was shot and instantly killed by John Bare.

Bare and a number of companions had been drinking during the day and just previous to the tragedy "Brick" Johnson had ordered them out of the saloon. Bare immediately went to his home secured his 30-30 rifle; before leaving his home his wife endeavored to stop him from taking the gun and was knocked down a couple times by her enraged husband. After leaving the house he met Carl Horner who tried to take the rifle away from him but did not succeed. Bare informing Horner that he was going down town to give the fellows a good time. He passed through a livery stable and told the hostler to saddle a horse for him as he would be back in a few minutes. Passing in through the back door of Ott's saloon, Bare came to the end of the bar and taking deliberate aim at "Brick" Johnson, who was sitting on the bar talking to Fritz Ott, Frank Ott and Wm. Hammock, shot him in the back of the head, the bullet tearing the top of "Brick's" head off.

Bare threw another cartridge into his rifle and passed out the back door, went to the livery stable for horse, hostler informed him there was not a saddle animal in barn. Bare threatened to kill hostler, who made a flying jump over a six foot door and escaped. Bare then held up a boy named McNulty who was riding a horse and compelled the boy to accompany him.

Just at this time Sheriff Blakely arrived on the scene with a borrowed rifle and opened fire on Bare; the third shot wounded the pony and upon trying to fire fourth shot, Blakely discovered that the magazine was empty and rifle useless. Bare dropped upon his knees, using McNulty boy for shield, drew a bead on Blakely and told him to "hit the hike." Bare then continued his flight on foot, and from traces discovered next morning, it is supposed that he passed part of the night in a small canyon about one mile from Enterprise.

At this place he expected to make a stand as he had barricaded himself with a wall of rocks.

Marshall E. W. Wagner of Joseph, was telephoned by; he and deputy sheriff S. D. Keltner and others sent the night in the hills around Enterprise, but found no trace of Bare. Tuesday morning about nine o'clock a small posse was organized and started on the man hunt.

The posse left Enterprise about 10 o'clock Tuesday morning and made for the brakes of the Imnaha and Snake river, but after covering the ground as thoroughly as possible they found no trace of Bare, and Sheriff Blakely and Marsha. Wagner returned into the valley Wednesday evening seeking a clue whereby they might locate the direction Bare took.

It is almost an impossible task to find Bare with the start that he had, as he knows every foot of the country and if he once reached the brakes of the Imnaha he would be safe from discovery for the present. Bare has the reputation of being a very cool, nery man, also one of the best rifle shots in the valley; if the posse comes up with him and he resists several lives will be lost before he is captured.—Joseph Herald.

AMERICAN MACHINERY FOR INDIA

New York, June 18—Americans will supply the equipment for a hydro-electric plant to furnish power for a railroad system and commercial enterprises in the Cashmere Valley in Northern India. Ten million dollars will be expected for the work. The plant will be situated on the Jhelum River, which is capable of developing about 100,000 horse power. A railway will be built the entire length of the valley a distance of 180 miles. The Jhelum River will be deepened to prevent annual floods. One hundred thousand acres of rice land will be reclaimed and various cities will be supplied with power. The Cashmere Valley is full of factories and here the famous Cashmere shawls are woven. Few outsiders have been allowed to enter the valley which is over one mile above the sea level. The government is independent under a Maharajah whose annual tribute to the British government is one horse, twelve shawl goats and three pairs of Cashmere Shawls. In the powerhouses will be installed twelve 1,000-kilowatt generators built by the general Electric Company which will be connected with the water turbines. The contracts stipulates that no piece of machinery shall weigh more than four tons for the reason that there is two hundred miles of road transportation including a lift over a mountain 8,000 feet high. Bullock carts the capacity of which is five tons will transport the machinery. The first notable American project in electrical development in India was at Carvery Falls where a 12,000 horse power plant was installed to transmit power to the Mysore gold fields.
