Well! George E. Chamberlain may say "The people of Oregon have honored him enough without adding a Vice Presidential victory to the list," yet it is hard to believe that he will turn down so desirable and so honorable a position.

Will it be Roosevelt and Bryan in 1908? It looks that way now but it is quite always in advance, to fix up political stages with any degree of certainty of their being carried out. There is no question but what Mr. Bryan is the strongest man today in the Democratic party and President Roosevelt is the idol of the people irrespective of party lines and it is quite possible that the Republicans backed by a generous general sentiment will demand that the President stand for re-election. The people want actors these days and not grand stand players and Roosevelt certainly accomplishes what he undertakes and so far it seems that nothing is too large for him to undertake.

The house of representatives has thirteen millionaires. Five from New York, two from Pennsylvania and two from Illinois. John E. Andrus of New York leads the list with \$50,000,000; next is William B. McKinley of Illinois with \$12,000,000 and William Randolph Hearst claims the third place with \$10,000,000. The house has not been the place for retired millionaires while the senate has always been a home for retired American men of millions. The wealthiest man of the senate is W. A. Clark whose friends claim him the richest man in the world. Oregon is not represented by men of millions in that august assembly of money and brains, but should statement No. 1 hold good as per ante-election pledges the state will have Mr. Jonathan Bourne Jr. who has expectations. The trend of recent years has been to select men for Senators who enumerated their wealth by the millions. Representatives have been nearer the choice of the people. While extreme wealth has not been a barrier to the house of representatives still it has not been a necessary quality. Some of the most efficient legislators have been comparatively poor but they were workers. Only thirteen out of the entire house is a very small percentage and well sustains our democratic pretensions. It is admitted that extreme poverty is an impenetrable barrier. This is not to be lamented. It is a well established fact that sterling business qualities will overcome poverty even if they do not win a fortune. Without those attributes no man is worthy of a place in the legislative halls of America.
