Frank L. Merrick, who so successfully managed the press bureau of the Lewis & Clark Exposition, has taken charge of the publicity of the Alaska-Yukon Pacific Exposition, which will be held at Seattle from June 6 to September 30, 1909.

Since 1898 there have been completed for the French navy, thirteen armored cruisers, which may be divided into five types: Three units of 7,700 tons, three of 9,600 tons, five of 10,000 tons, one of 11,300 tons, and one of 12,500 tons. In addition to these, there are under construction three additional cruisers of 12,500 tons, and three of 13,600 tons.

James L.
