Washington D. C. July 3—The Navy Department is about to get out a new naval recruiting lithograph as a means of advertising the advantages of enlistment in the navy. This will be a placard, thirty-six by thirty inches, with five pictures of ships, those of the Bonhomme Richard, the Constitution, the Hartford, the Olympia, and the Kansas, representing various types of American warships from the time of the Revolution to the present day. ONLY ONE WITNESS.

Chicago, July 3—The government today introduced but one witness in the rebate investigation. This was Elmer Cusick, a traffic manager. Kansas City July 2—John Speyer, who was first tried and sentenced to the penitentiary for twenty years for the murder of his little son, was convicted of murder in the first degree this morning on retrial and will be sentenced to hang.

TRUSTS ARE NOW TAMED

Cleveland Ohio, July 3—Commissioner Garfield says that he had nothing to do officially with the Standard Oil cases nor of the various grand juries and states that he only conferred incidentally with District Attorney Sullivan while here.

Garfield said that the Union Steel and Tobacco reports will be the first ones ready for the president. It is impossible to tell definitely when they will be completed. The government right to investigate is clearly established by the courts. Corporations are now readily furnishing information upon demand. Action against the railroads and the Standard Oil Company will be followed by an investigation of the Chicago, Kansas City and Buffalo roads.

THAW MUST TAKE HIS TURN

New York, July 3—Thaw, the slayer of White, was arraigned this morning in order that his counsel might withdraw his plea, if they wished to submit motions. His counsel made a strong plea for an early trial, declaring that Thaw was suffering from his confinement in the toms and that if he remained there three months that he would die. Prosecuting Attorney Jerome reiterated his statement that Thaw must take his turn with the other prisoners.

The defense is still making every effort to find proof that White endeavored to force his attention upon Mrs. Thaw. So far no legal proof has been found.

HIS MOTHER IGNORANT

London, July 3—The steamer Minneapolis, on which Thaw's mother was a passenger, arrived at the Tilbury dock this morning. The mother had not yet heard of her son's difficulty. Captain Gates was informed by wireless telegraphy before landing but was asked not to inform Mrs. Thaw. The Earl of Yarmouth, her son-in-law, and countless, made a special request of the reporters not to tell Mrs. Thaw, who looked ill. Her daughter will break the news to her.
