Commercial America reports that the preliminary estimate of the U. S. Census Bureau places the total value of the output of the meat-packing houses of the United States for 1905 at \$913,913,324, compared with \$785,562,433 in 1900. The value of animals slaughtered in 1905 was \$805,856,969, compared with \$683,583,577 in 1900. The number of packing houses in 1905 is placed at 929 compared with 921 in 1900, and the capital of these establishments is placed at \$237,699,440 in 1905 against \$189,198,164 in 1900.
