WAR ON WILD MUSTARD

The experience of A. E. Winterman o Edwall with wild mustard on his farm, is perhaps, not an isolated instance of the ruin that can be wrought by this noxious weed, but it serves to emphasize the necessity of making more vigorous war on a pest capable of setting at naught a great deal of the farmer's labor with his crops.

The loss of the wheat on a quarter section of land would certainly be a serious matter to the majority of farmers and it behooves all, as well in their own interest as out of consideration for their neighbors, to rest not until they have eradicated the weed. Many have been quick to recognize the danger and exert strenuous eff rts to rid themselves of the wild mustard. Some, it is to be regretted. show negligence, and are doing a grave injustice to the whole community.
