### WAR ON WILD MUSTARD

The experience of A. E. Winterman of Edwall with wild mustard on his farm, is perhaps, not an isolated instance of the ruin that can be wrought by this noxious weed, but it serves to emphasize the necessity of making more vigorous war on a pest capable of setting at naught a great deal of the farmer's labor with his crops.

The loss of the wheat on a quarter section of land would certainly be a serious matter to the majority of farmers and it behooves all, as well in their own interest as out of consideration for their neighbors, to rest not until they have eradicated the weed. Many have been quick to recognize the danger and exert strenuous efforts to rid themselves of the wild mustard. Some, it is to be regretted, show negligence, and are doing a grave injustice to the whole community.

In the towns, as well as on the farms, it is necessary to be up and doing. This fact was recently recognized at Ritzville, where a "mustard day" was appointed for the purpose of destroying all the wild mustard in the city and vicinity. It was a sort of supplemental "cleaning up" day, and Ritzville's example might well be followed by others.—Spokesman Review.

### SLOW WITH THEIR WAR REPORTS

The literature on the war between Russia and Japan is not so promptly accessible as had been hoped by service people. The Navy Department has published one volume, the report of Surgeon W. C. Braisted, U. S. N., as the result of that officer's observations with the Japanese forces, mostly at the base hospitals. The next report to come out will probably be that of another naval surgeon, Dr. Raymond Spear, now attached to the United States ship Baltimore, who was with the Russian army in Manchuria, and who had unusual opportunities of observation.
