This district composes most of the seaboard provinces and a part of Corea. Shanghai will be the judicial headquarters. The salary allotted to the judgeship is fixed at ten thousand dollars.

FRANK D. CALLAN SUICIDES

 Chicago, July 5—Frank D. Callan, at the head of a large real estate firm, committed suicide this morning to escape alleged prosecution for a dozen criminal charges. One case was filed against him by Miss Nellie Alphine, charging him with misappropriation of funds entrusted for investment. His trial was set for a few hours after his untimely death. Aggregate claims will reach a hundred thousand, and his victims are mostly wage earning women. The largest claim was seventy-four hundred dollars. He tried to end his life by asphyxiation but was interrupted by his family who called a doctor. While the physician was preparing the medicine he shot himself dead.

UNION COUNTY

We do not believe that there is another county in the Inland Empire that can show fourteen different industries whose total annual revenue produces an average of \$193,000.00 cash. The annual report of the State labor Commissioner, places Union County third in the state, in the employment of labor. It requires 194 solid trains of forty cars each to carry the produce of our county to the market, more than a train every other day throughout the year. "An admirable climate." The past winter only for a few hours did the mercury reach zero. No excessive heat in the summer and our cool refreshing nights cannot be appreciated by the residents of the east until they are permitted to enjoy them. Our soil is rich and productive. Were we to mention yields they would not be believed. The only way to become acquainted with this "Garden of Eden" is to personal visit this land of diversity, as when you see the crops growing and harvested they speak for themselves. Our forests will require many many decades of the present activity before they begin to yield and we now have thirty or more saw mills which give employment the year round in the mills and logging camps.

The only sugar beet factory in the state is located at La Grande, the County Seat of Union County with a population of 8,000, progressive wide awake people who extend the glad hand to all. This is the commercial, educational and social center of the county. La Grande is known as the railroad town of the O. R. & N. Co. whose annual payroll at this place exceeds \$200,000.00. From here the branch road is now pushing through the northern part of this county, on into the Wallowa County, starts a freight division, machine shops, round houses, and one of the largest railroad yards on the system, and train dispatchers office. The public schools of La Grande are second to none in cities of this size in this state. We now have three buildings and a fourth, an eight room brick building in course of construction, giving employment to twenty-two teachers. The principal office of the Grande Ronde Electric Co. is located in this city. This Company furnishes power and light for the city of La Grande, Island City, Cove, Union, and the Hot Lake Sanitorium.
