## TOBACCO IN CHINA.

Washington, D. C. July 6-In reply to many inquiries from this country as to the possibility of building up a trade in American leaf tobacco in China, Consul George E. Anderson has sent a reply, in which he says: "Already there is considerable business done in foreign leaf Shanghai alone importing \$150,000 wort last year; but this was mostly for use of foreigners. The real Chinese trade is not reached. When it is considered that the same port imported through the customs alone \$1,250,000 worth of prepared native leaf and \$333,000 worth of native leaf, with probably a similar or even a greater amount of each imported through the Likin routes, it can be seen that the real tobacco trade of China is enormous. But the greater portion of the tobacco consumption gets into no trade reports for the leaf is produced. largely among the mulberry trees, cured, and consumed on the farms or in the villages.
