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WITTE BLAMES THE DOUMA

Vichy, France July 10—Count Witte who has been resting here for some time away from the turmoil of Russian politics was sufficiently recovered today to leave for Aix-les-Bains where he will spend another month, after which he may go to Italy or Switzerland preparatory to return to Russia in the fall to take up the works of the state. He is credited with holding the view that the representative branch of Douma is doing its utmost to become a revolutionary body, delaying reforms and maintaining chaos; that the Jews by placing themselves at the head of the Revolutionary movement make it possible for their friends to assist them; that all Russians must consider the necessity of preventing inconsiderate action by revolutionaries.
