

ORDINANCE NO. 329

An Ordinance authorizing the Mayor and Recorder of the city of La Grande to enter into a contract with J. L. Mars for the construction of a sidewalk on Fourth street in said city.

The City of La Grande Does Ordain a follows:--

SECTION 1 The Mayor and Recorde of the City of La Grande is hereby authorized and instructed to enter into a contract with one J. L. Mars for the construction of a board sidewalk on the east side of Fourth street, from the south side of I street to the north side of C street in said city, for the sum of \$772.10.

Section 2 That said contract shall provide that said sidewalk shall be built under the supervision of the Street Superintendent of said City, who shall make the same comply with the requirements of the Ordinances of said City, and subject to the approval of the Street Committee

Section 3 This Ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after the 11th day of July, 1906, and shall be published in one issue of the La Grande Evening Observer.

Passed by the Council of the City of La Grande, Oregon, by 6 Councilmen voting therefor, and no Councilmen against the same.
