ELKS TO

Denver, Col., July 16.—As by the wand of a powerful fairy, Denver has been transformed into a purple city. From the railroad depot, where train after train arrives, bringing delegates to the national the financial statements for this and last ronvention of the Grand Lodge of the Be- year. The report, in part, as was sent to the nevolent and Protective Order of Elks and state superintendent follows: thousands of other visitors, far beyond the Capitol the royal purple of the orde greets the eye everywhere. Purple bunt ing decorates the business houses an private residences, purple flowers ador the window sills and bloom in profusio in every front yard and in every flowe bed in the parks and public squares. Pur ple streamers float in the breeze from the housetops and purple lights are strung across the streets, to shed purple ligh upon the festive scene at night.

Although the convention will not begi until this evening, the city is already fille with visitors. Every train rolling into th station brings delegatiods, accompanied by their ladies and other excursionists an many of the delegations are accompanies by bands. According to a conservative estimate, there are already about on nundred bands of music in the city and more are coming with every train. The arrangements for the reception of the delegates are as nearly perfect as they can be made. Although the hotels seem to be crowded already, it is asserted that there will be no difficulty in placing the thousands of delegates and other visitors who are still coming.

The business sessions of the Grand Lodge will be held tomorrow and Wednesday. Many matters of importance will come up for consideration, among others a proposition to gut down the member ship of the Grand Lodge, which now includes all past exalted rulers and is increasing at the rate of about a thousand a year. As this would soon make the Grand Lodge an enormous and unwielding body, an effort will be made to remedy this altogether too rapid increase. An other propoistion to be considered is that to make the position of the Exalted Rules of the Grand Lodge a salaried one and to require that officer to give all his time to the business of the order. This is considered necessary on account of the rapid ncrease in the membership of the order which has reached half a million, distribyted over 1,025 lodges. The organization is in a flourishing financial condition and has spent more than \$1,000,000 in charity during the past year.

The election of officers will take place tomorrow and great interest is manifested in that part of the proceedings. The California delegates are working hard for the election of Henry A. Melvin, judge of the superior court of Alameda county to the position of Grand Exaited Ruler, and it is believed that he will be elected.

Following the inclement weather, the Colorado skies appeared undimmed by clouds this morning. The Elks will have the most perfect weather for the opening of the convention tonight, It seems almost certain that Judge Malvin of Oak land, California, will be chosen exalted ruler. Dr. W. H. Haviland of Butte is to be the grand trustee according to reports.


