Railroads are hungry for ties. According to a report published by the United States forest service, railroads of this country purchased more than 80,000 000 cross ties in the year 1905. Of this aggregate 47% consisted of oak and 22% of pine ties. Of pine ties used the southern states furnished 81%, and Rocky Mountain district 10% or oak ties, the central states supplied 54%, the southern states 53% and the North Alantin states 12%. Preservative treatment was given about 10% of the total number of ties bought last year.

TRIM UP NOTICE

By the order of the City Council the Mayor was instructed to notify by publication, the owners or agents of lots and blocks within the city to have the fringes and ravelings on the margins of the streets and sidewalks trimmed up and smoothed down by pruning trees so the limbs will not obstruct the streets or sidewalks or interfere with head gear of pedestrians or drag the hay off wagons passing along the streets and by cutting and removing the grass and weeds that are unsightly or may be cause of fire.

You are also requested to remove the dry grass and weeds within lots that may endanger adjoining property during the dry season.

WILL MAKE TURBINE TESTS

Annapolis July 20—For the first time the naval engineering experimental station is to have money enough at its disposal to carry out the purpose of its founder. This station is located on the Naval Academy grounds, where a large building is now course of construction for it. The building will be filled with all sorts of clerks, mechanics and draftmen and for carrying on investigations. The latter work will cost about \$25,000 during the next twelve months. The program of inquiry has not yet been outlined, but the initial experiments will be applied to the turbine as a problem in marine propulsion.
