DRYDOCK DEWEY'S TRIP OVER

Washington, July 20.—The dry-dock Dewey, which went half around the world on its voyage to the Philippines, is now anchored off Rivera point. Olongapo naval station. At this place there is 65 feet of water, so that all vessels which may be sent into Drydock can reach it in perfect safety. The Dewey will be anchored with four huge mushroom anchors at each end, and as the tide rises only about one foot at Olongapo, there is little danger of the huge structure being moved.
