The threshing machine men of Union county have held a meeting in La Grande at which it was agreed to raise the price of threshing to 5 and 6 cents per bushel--5 cents for oats and barley and 6 for wheat. This is a raise of 1 sent per bushel on each variety of grain over former prices.

Coming on top of extraordinary prices for sacks this advance in the price of threshing has brought out a strong protest from the farmers and it is possible that many farmers will organize and buy machines to avoid the threshing trust.
