## STILL IS MISSING

After five days and nights of constant searching for little Cecil Brittain, who was lost at the tollgate Sunday night, the mystery surrounding that case is now almost as deep as ever. No trace whatever has been found of the lost boy, and the conviction that he was kidnapped is daily growing stronger.

A 'phone message from the tollgate this afternoon told the story of the same futile search as on the past four days.

For a time this morning it was thought a clew had been found when one of the Draper dogs took up a trail which is thought to have been made by a man implicated in the kidnapping if such occurred. The dog was loosened and allowed to follow the trail. However, the scent was lost after the dog had followed the trail in the direction of Stout Springs.

In view of the distance which the child was tracked by the bloodhounds and some other things, the people at the tollgate believe the little boy was stolen. However, they are reticent to accuse any one in the absence of proof, and so far no one has been directly implicated in the crime.

Sheriff Taylor is still at the tollgate taking part in the search for the missing boy and striving to secure some evidence that will lead to his discovery if kidnapped.

## INJURED SEARCHER BETTER

Tollgate, July 20.—Milan Laffin, the camp tender who was accidentally shot while searching for Cecil Brittain, rested well last night and Dr. Robinson reported this morning that he stood a splendid chance to recover. Laffin was shot about three inches below the heart the ball passing through the body and emerging at the back. Miss Fowler, the nurse from the Walla Walla hospital, arrived at 5 o'clock this morning, and is now in charge of the patient. Dr. Robinson will remain with Laffin several days in order to attend him. —E. O.

## UNION COUNTY PRICES

The threshing machine men of Union county have held a meeting in La Grande at which it was agreed to raise the price of threshing to 5 and 6 cents per bushel—5 cents for oats and barley and 6 for wheat. This is a raise of 1 cent per bushel on each variety of grain over former prices.

Coming on top of extraordinary prices for sacks this advance in the price of threshing has brought out a strong protest from the farmers and it is possible that many farmers will organize and buy machines to avoid the threshing trust.

Grain is ripening rapidly but it is thought that machines could be secured by the farmers in time to thresh the crop without serious loss. The hot weather has damaged crops but slightly in Union county and haying is now in progress in all parts of the county.—Athena Press.

## ELGIN CERTAIN OF SAW MILL

C. R. Hibbard, a rancher, was over from Elgin this morning and while in the city reported that Elgin will very likely have a large saw mill in the near future as La Grande.

The instigator of this enterprise is S. H. Graves, of Shelton Nebraska. This man is a wealthy banker and financier of that place and has spent several days in Elgin looking over a site for an up-to-date saw mill. He was apparently satisfied with conditions as he has gone back to Omaha to interest more capital and will soon inform the city of Elgin whether or not he will build there. If he does, it will be a mill of 100,000 feet capacity per day. Mr. Hibbard seems confident that the big thing is forthcoming, and soon.

## MOB AFTER OKLAHOMA NEGRO

Oklahoma, City, July 21.—A special to the Morning Oklahoman says that Rufus Carter, a negro, aged 20, had assaulted a seven year old daughter of a miner named Huferty at Henrietta, Wednesday afternoon. The negro was caught and identified. He was taken in charge by the federal authorities and moved over night to Weleetka, where he was jailed. It is understood that the miners at Henrietta have organized and moved to Weleetka, in an effort to get Carter and lynch him. Rumors that a pitched battle had occurred could not be verified.

## ASK HELP AGAINST PEASANTS

Odessa, July 21.—Governor General Kaulbars has been overwhelmed recently with appeals for military assistance from land owners in the districts of Kherson, Yekaterinoslav and Poltava against the peasantry, who are organized and led by revolutionists. Cossacks only are furnished for such duties, as loyalty of the regular troops is not to be depended upon.
