SPIRITS TO ATTEND CAMP MEETING

 Onset Bay, Mass., July 25—Several hundred spiritualists and students of psychic phenomena are in attendance at the thirteenth annual session of the Spiritualist and Liberal Camp Meeting which opened here today. The informal opening took place yesterday and an interesting program was arranged for the occasion. In the forenoon Dr. George A. Fuller delivered an address and in the afternoon Mrs. C. Fannie Allyn of Stoneham, Mass., spoke. She was followed by Mrs. Katie M. Ham of Haverhill, who made some interesting and successful tests. The actual conference will begin this afternoon. The session this year will continue until August 26. In connection with the regulation program the Onset school of Philosophy will open on July 30th with a series of lectures by Miss Susie C. Clark, of Cambridge, upon physical culture, intuition memory, psychometry and soul expression. Cora L. Richmond of Chicago will speak on sculd and planets, astrology, prenatal influence of planets, etc. The noted actor-minister, Rev. Wilson Fritch will speak on metaphysics, telepathy, clairvoyance, spirit communication, aura, and color symmetry. Test seances will be given daily by noted mediums.

STARTING AN EARLY CAMPAIGN

 Annapolis, Md., July 25.—The friends of Henry M. Paul, professor of mathematics, are making a preliminary campaign in his behalf in anticipation of the retirement in February, 1908, of Edward K. Rawson, the head of the department of English and law at the Naval Academy. Professor Paul is one of the best known officers of his corps, and was for a long time on duty in the bureau of yards and docks as an expert in ventilation and heating, and as such had charge of the specifications relating to those features of the buildings erected at navy yards and stations. He has been on duty at the Naval Academy for a year or more, and is eminently fitted to succeed to the place at the head of the department of English and law, in which Professor Rawson has attained considerable distinction.
