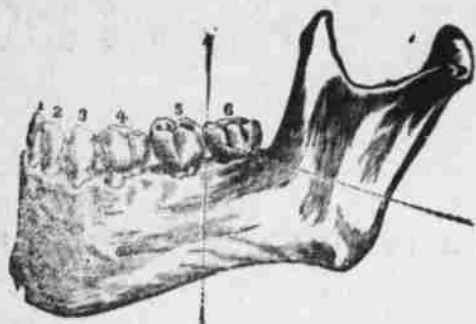
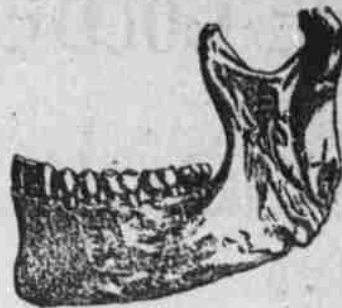

SEARCH FOR CECIL BRITTAN THE LOST BOY IS ABANDONED

The mystery of the disappearance of 4 year old Cecil Brittan still deepens and is far from solution as ever. All organized search has been abandoned, and attention is now being devoted to the unraveling of the numerous theories of abduction.

The basis of operations is unraveling the mystery has been removed to a large extent from the Toll Gate and is being handled by the officers of both Oregon and Washington. Sheriff Taylor, of Union county, was among the last of the searching parties to leave on Saturday. He had been out in the mountains the previous day but if he had found anything that offered even a clue to the solution of the problem he would not give it out.

The only thing of interest that transpired yesterday was the presence of a claim agent and her husband from Pleasanton. She claimed that the boy had been held in captivity in the mountains across the meadow and south of the Toll Gate but had been removed within the past 12 hours to a sawmill.

It is generally believed that the boy will be returned before many days or his abductors captured. It will be next to impossible for them to get him out of the mountains without being discovered, as it has developed that every possible avenue is being closely guarded. If they remain in hiding in the mountains it is practically certain that some sheepman or forest ranger will discover their whereabouts before many days. Both the rangers are acquainted with every part of the mountains and will take it upon themselves to keep a sharp lookout.

The kidnappers are possibly aware of this condition of affairs and the only plausible theory of the child being returned is that the child will be mysteriously delivered at some point during the night and thus give the abductors a chance to make a get-away.

Should they attempt to take the child out of the mountains they would be greatly handicapped in traveling and run great chances of being captured.—Walla Walla Union.

OFFICERS ARE MISINFORMED

Coroner M. K. Hall and Sheriff F. P. Chiles, returned last evening from a trip to the toll gate on the Westland road where they went in response to a telephone message stating that the body of a sheep herder had been found. The trip, though a hard one, was useless, as the operator in transmitting the message, made a mistake in giving the location of the body. When the facts were finally brought to light it was discovered that it was a case where a Union county officer is not interested as the body is in Walla Walla county. The facts as given by the Walla Walla Union regarding the man are as follows:

Toll Gate, July 22.—The body of John Prei was found early this morning about 30 miles east of here, across the Little Salmon river. Prei was a sheep herder for Martin McCumber, a sheep man of Union county, Oregon, and had been dead six or seven days when his body was discovered. Mr. McCumber did not disturb or examine the body but immediately started for Toll Gate, where the nearest telephone is located, and notified the sheriff and coroner of Union county. By reason of not disturbing the body he was unable to tell whether the man had been murdered or had accidentally killed himself. He said the body was found leaning up against a log, while his rifle was leaning up against the other side of the same log.

The first intimation Mr. McCumber had that all was not well with the herder was when he visited the camp and yesterday morning found that nobody had been there for several days. He immediately went over to the sheep camp of David Bros. of Walla Walla, a few miles distant, and the herder there informed him that he had been caring for a strange band of sheep for several days. He described how the sheep and dogs had been wandering over the mountains and finally came into his camp. He could not find the herder who was supposed to have charge of them and did not have time to do anything but care for them as best he could until somebody else arrived.

Mr. McCumber returned to his own range and made a search, which resulted in the discovery of the body of the herder.—Walla Walla Union.

THE PAN-AMERICAN CONGRESS

Rio de Janeiro, July 24.—The third Pan American Congress which was formally opened here last week, met again today to conclude the preliminaries, before the actual work of the Congress is taken up. Some of the most important preliminaries have already been settled by the Congress and the rest will undoubtedly be arranged this week. The proposition has been definitely adopted that the Congress will close on September 1, regardless of unfinished business which may be on hand at that time.

It is expected that a five minute rule will be adopted for the deliberations of the Congress, thus making it possible to prevent interminable debate on the many questions to be considered, which will doubtless provoke a great variety of opinions. Delegates who have propositions to lay before the Congress will be granted thirty minutes for an opening address, but after the subject has been formally presented to the Congress, the addresses are to be limited to five minutes.

In a number of important details the rules of the Congress will materially differ from those of the first two congresses. The purpose of the change is merely to prevent entanglements which might result from prolonged discussion of subjects on which there is great division of sentiment.

The United States cruiser Charleston is expected here tomorrow and everything is in readiness for the reception of Secretary Root and his wife and daughter, who will remain here twelve days and will be hospitably entertained. Many social and state functions have been arranged in honor of Mr. Root's visit.

HOMEBUILDERS MEET AT CINCINNATI
