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HEAD ON COLLISION IN UTAH

Echo Utah July 25—One of the worst freight wrecks in the history of the Oregon Short Line occurred last night by a head on collision between a regular freight and an extra. The smash up came at Review just west of Green River. The main line is completely blocked and traffic is at a standstill. The crews of the trains saw what would happen and after setting their levers both crews jumped and thus saved their lives. Many were hurt, however, from jumping from the engines or from flying timbers.

SOLDIERS IN MT. GRENA CAMP

July 25—The great convention camp for the troops of the Department of the East was opened here last week but not until yesterday was the camp completed and ready to receive the troops ordered to concentrate here. The troops began to arrive here from all parts of the East yesterday and continued to come in today. It is expected that by tonight nearly all the troops intended for this camp will have arrived. The concentration movement is under the command of General Grant who will direct the operations of the troops during the encampment which will last until September 30. Everything is in good order and thanks to the careful preparations there is no confusion.

WINNERS WILL ELECT NEW OFFICERS

CHICAGO UNIONS IN LIMELIGHT

Chicago Ill. July 25—Cook county grand jury today returned an indictment of a hundred and twenty-five pages in length, the longest ever returned. It covers the alleged criminal acts of labor leaders in Chicago for the past year. Among them are counts against teamster leaders of the national unions who have conspired against businesses of Chicago. Many acts of conspiracy have been committed against Marshall Field, Montgomery Ward and Company, express companies and other business concerns. Charges of murder are in the indictment. A general scathing arraignment of Chicago organized labor is within the pages.

PEASANT RESISTANCE WILL MEAN RUSSIA'S DOWNFALL

Says Rational Leaders of Turbulent Nation—Pleas Made for a Quiet Submission to Imperial Decree—Striking workmen Join in Singing "Marseilles"

St. Petersburg, July 25—Count Heyden Prince Iwoff and M. C. Stackovich, the three members of the parliament who refused to sign the parliament address to the country at Viberg on July 25, today issued a separate address appealing to the people to quietly submit to the imperial decree dissolving the parliament and prepare for the election of a new parliament. The addresses point out that the Emperor acted within the constitutional rights and that it would be a crime to make an attempt to shake the power of the sovereign at this time.

They all declared that resistance at this time will result in the final economic and political ruin of Russia.

Troops are continuing to enter Moscow. The city is under martial law, and as the steamer carrying workmen arrived it was ordered to stop in the bay. The workmen went on board singing Marseilles but their songs were not heard far ashore on account of the fact that the authorities forbade them to land.

Milyoukova, a legislature leader and formerly a professor in the university of Chicago says that he did not accept the Viberg appeal to establish the rebel government because he did not know the strength and also believes that the army and navy favors legislation. It is apparent that the liberal government will be reached without blood shed. At present the government days are numbered but a civil war is unlikely, although the people will eventually fight the parliament if a ministry is not formed after the new parliament is organized.

The government, in order to get rid of its trouble makers has given each member of the dispersed duma a first class

ticket home and five dollars for expenses.

The police escorted each member to the railroad station and arrested all sympathizers who cheered, but failed to do so with the signers of the Viberg appeal because they wish to pacify the people as much as possible.

Moscow July 25—The people are recovering from the first stupefaction caused by the dissolution of the Duma, but they feel that it did its work in establishing beyond a question the fact that Russia must have a constitutional government. Even the strongest reactionaries do not care to suggest the abolishment of a representative government except for the Agrarian disorder which everywhere are more or less frequent. The country about Moscow is quiet.

Odessa, July 25—The militia was dismissed today in self defense. They and an organization of "Hooligans" armed with rifles have been fighting in Moldavanska all day. In this district alone, the dead are lying around by the tons. Besides the dead, hundreds are wounded. The people are completely panic stricken and act like a flock of sheep.

WAR MAPS OF THE UNITED STATES

Washington, D. C. July 25—The Geological Survey has a confidential arrangement with the War Department by which the topographical sheets made by the surveyors of the Geological Survey are furnished to the General Staff of the army. These sheets go into the details of the country over which the surveyors travel every year, and show the location of places of supply of water and forage, the situation of blacksmith shops, bridges, the places to ford streams and the condition of the roads. This information is of great value in connection with the accumulation of material destined to be of value in time of trouble, or on other occasions when the army must go into a new section of the country.

GOV. JELKS TO ADDRESS EDITORS

Gadsden, Ala., July 25—The annual meeting of the Alabama Press Association was called to order here this morning and the visiting members were welcomed by Mayor Smith and the Rev. J. R. McMullen. Mr. Max Hamburger, editor of the Mobile Herald, responded and was followed by President Charles H. Greer, of the State association, who delivered his annual address. There will be another session in the afternoon, when Gov. Jelks and Senator Morgan will deliver addresses. The rest of the day will be given up to recreation. The business sessions will not begin until tomorrow. An interesting program for the convention has been prepared and will include a discussion of the subject of foreign advertising. It is expected that after the adjournment of the convention tomorrow, many of the members will go to the Atlantic beach where they will remain one week.

VANDALS RAZE CASTLES

Two columns of royal troops are advancing to the scene, one from the west and one from the east. Before they can reach the scene of devastation, many other old and grand castles will be razed.

NATIONAL PROBLEMS ARE SOLVED

London, July 25—The conference of inter-parliamentary union ended today. The body adopted a resolution which advises the Hague conference to define contraband of war, as being restricted to fire arms, munitions and explosives, and that captured ships should not be destroyed; that even belligerent and private property shall be immune. The conference also advised the Hague to cut down intolerable expenditures for armament.

YEGGEMEN ARRESTED

DEAD ARE COUNTED BY THOUSANDS

CARBINE TEAM MATCH AT CREEDMOOR

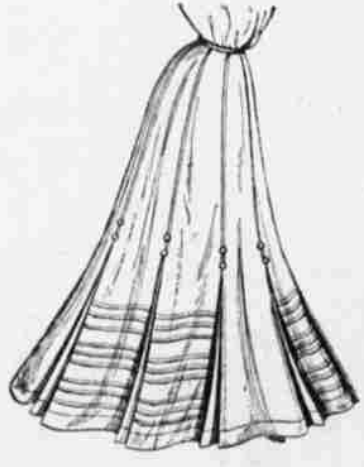
