Three honored guests were three of those same pioneers who almost sixty years before had dared the awful trip across the plains, that lead to the founding of the rich empire of Utah in the fertile valley of Salt Lake.

The three pioneers were John D. Stark, of the Oregon Lumber company's store; Mrs. Sarah Eccles, grandmother of John H. Eccles, and Mrs. Heggie, whose son is employed by the Oregon Lumber company, and who has just recently arrived in Baker from Salt Lake.

The program was made up of singing by the choir of the church, under the direction of Prof. Edwards; graphophone music and a talk by James W. Eardley upon the "Pioneers and their Wonderful Trip Across the Plains."
