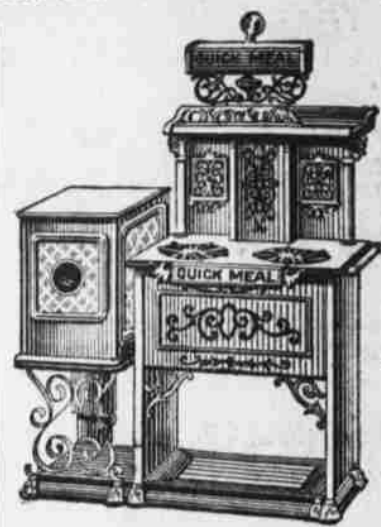

Contrary to the general belief that alfalfa is a good fat-producing food but poor in muscle building material, the government's analysis show that it is richer in protein than any other forage. If fed in proper balanced rations in no more than required quantities, it will prove the most economical and satisfactory fodder now in use. Not too much nor as an exclusive feed, will soon place it in the rank where it belongs.

The Secretary of the Interior has awarded the contract to Puget Sound Bridge & Dredging company, of Seattle, for the construction of the storage feed canal of the Umatilla irrigation project. The work of the contract involves the construction of 25 miles of canal from the Umatilla river near Echo to the Cold Spring reservoir, and consists of 700,000 cubic yards of earth excavation, 6000 cubic yards of rock excavation, 2200 cubic yards of concrete and 2600 cubic yards of riprap. The bid of the successful contractor was \$161,588.

The foreign trade of the United States during the fiscal year recently closed makes one of the biggest showings on record. While imports have been enormous, including food stuffs and various agricultural products that must all be produced at home, it is gratifying to note that manufactured goods are showing a steadily widening outlet in foreign countries. In round numbers the exports exceeded the imports by half a billion dollars showing a handsome balance of trade in our favor. An always most cause than half the exports from the United States were in the form of farm products. The disturbance over the packing house regulations did not appear to result in a loss of export trade in canned meats, etc. extending the closing month of the fiscal year. It remains to be seen how far in the present year these trade losses will extend. The new federal law which greatly enlarges the inspection of meat products has removed the apprehensions at home, but it may take longer to calm the fears of the consumers abroad. One gratifying phase of our foreign trade is the evidence of recovery to full time dimensions in the export of breadstuffs and corn. The department of commerce and labor at Washington through trusted agents is seeking to extend the markets for American products in foreign countries, and congress fortunately has encouraged this work.

If the authorities in towns over populated with idlers these busy times would give these gentry a positive invitation to take up with a rock pile or a harvesting mechanism of some sort there would be a big slump in the labor market.—Echo Register.

TEXAS ENCAMPMENT

Austin, Tex., July 27.—By this evening the militia and regular troops of this department will all be in the big camp established near this city. The troops will remain in camp until September 30 and will go through extensive manoeuvres, drills and field exercises. A canteen has been established in the camp, but as the manoeuvre and camping grounds are under State jurisdiction, the Federal authorities will not raise any objections. Many of the troops have marched long distances before they reached this city, in some instances the distances covered was more than 200 miles.

SEN. HIPPS SLAYER HANGED

Montgomery, Ala., July 27.—John Williams of Cullman county, the murderer of State Senator Robert Hipp, was executed by hanging today. The crime for which Williams paid the death penalty was the shooting of State Senator Hipp when the latter, accompanied by officers of the law, attempted to enforce a writ depriving Williams of his farm in Cullman county. Angered by the order of the officers, Williams entered the bedroom of his house, picked up a rifle and opened fire. He wounded one of the officers accompanying Mr. Hipp, seriously, while another shot took effect in the back of the head of the Senator, as the latter was leaving the house.

WATERMELONS FOR THE BLUEJACKETS

New York, July 27.—The refrigerating ship Glacier has nearly completed its loading and will be ready to sail for Dominican waters tomorrow. The ship will carry a large load of good things for the officers, bluejackets and marines of the American fleet which has been patrolling the Dominican coast for some time. There will be enough fresh meats to last the sailors two or three weeks, all sorts of fresh vegetables and 25,000 big watermelons. These good things are sent to the fleet as a token of the satisfaction of the Navy Department with the manner in which the officers and men of the fleet have discharged their duties during the tedious and monotonous patrolling cruises.
