HONOR GOV. GEARY'S MEMORY

New Cumberland, Pa., July 27.—The Geary celebration in honor of the memory of former Governor Geary began here this morning with a grand civic and industrial parade, in which the merchants of the various cities in this district and many civic organizations participated. In the evening there will be a band concert, singing by a large chorus and addresses by Gov. Pennypacker and Congressman M. E. Olmsted. The celebration will be continued tomorrow, when the firemen will hold a big parade. Another band concert will be held tomorrow evening and it will be followed by public exercises at which Judge Wilbur F. Sadler, Robert Snodgrass and others will deliver addresses. On Sunday a big union service will be held in the public square, beginning at ten o'clock.

KISSED WIFE BY MISTAKE

According to a newspaper account, Judge Orville Davis Jones, of Edina, Mo., who was populist candidate for governor of his state in 1896, is being sued for divorce on an entirely new ground—that of kissing his own wife by mistake. The mistake was—so Mrs. Jones alleges—that the judge took her to be the servant girl, Katie, and administered a more fervid salute than any that had come her way in some years. It was not the fervor involved in the osculation that Mrs. Jones objected to, but the vicariousness.

ROOT IN RIO DE JANEIRO

Rio de Janeiro July 27.—Secretary of state Root arrived here today from the United States and was welcomed by the civil and military authorities.

PREL IS BURIED

C. W. P. Ellsworth of Island City has returned from Toll Gate where he went as deputy coroner to bury the late Mr. Prel who was found dead about thirty miles from Toll Gate. When Union county officials first went there they decided that the dead man's body was in Umatilla county, and returned here. Since then it was decided that Union's coroner really had the jurisdiction, consequently Mr. Ellsworth was deputized. However, when he reached there he found that a Umatilla coroner had returned a verdict of accidental suicide, and buried the man where he died. The verdict is not satisfactory to the Union man however as he believes that Prel met his death at the hands of an enemy.


