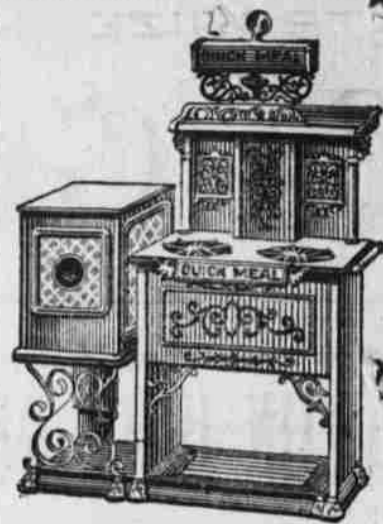

**GOOD MANNERS**

It is hardly necessary to express the opinion that if the ghosts of our ancestors were to walk the earth today they would be shocked in many ways. If we shall judge the progress of the world by the manners of its people, it is not very apparent that we are even holding our own. Time was when good breeding was considered of some consequence in the world and the manners of a person, in public and private, indicative of his breeding. Perhaps in the matter of manners would the "shades" of our fathers and mothers receive the greatest shock.

Today the majority of parents seem to be sadly remiss in teaching their children good manners. Nor does the lack of courtesy, good address, and many little indefinable qualities which indicate culture in the rearing apply to children alone—we see it in young men and women who have outgrown parental restraint, sad to relate.

We can recognize a good-mannered young man or woman—the actions of an ill-bred person also attracts attention, but receive no approval. It seems too many are getting up in the world as "Topsy" did, and she "just grewed."

**CROP WEALTH INCONCEIVABLE**

In neither this nor any other country from the time when nations first were founded had last year's bumper crops ever been paralleled now in the July crop report of the government, which partly reveals and in part promises an equally inconceivable mass of perishable wealth. Corn promises a yield of only 4,000,000 bushels behind last year's huge record of 2,700,000,000 bushels. Potatoes, oats and barley are likely to be somewhat below last year, but much of which is already harvested, may go beyond the record by 30,000,000 bushels.

The four great farm crops of corn, hay, wheat and oats in order of their gross value, will probably be worth this year about \$2,750,000,000. All the gold dug in all the world in the 414 years since Columbus discovered America would buy but four such crops.

The Union Pacific, which owned hundreds of thousands of acres of choice land in Nebraska that was sold and improved years ago, always reserved in their deeds a 100-foot strip for right of way. Just now this old clause is making trouble for farmers whose land is worth \$150 per acre, as Northern Pacific surveyors are running lines through their tracts with an abandon that seems heartless to the farmers.—Capital News.

According to late dispatches from the north, there was great suffering in Moscow for a whole day this week, on account of a local beer famine. Such a serious condition could be averted by the use of good cold storage houses, so that a larger quantity could be kept in stock. It is not likely, however, that such a condition will be again permitted.—Ex.
