**INTERESTING DISCOVERIES IN EGYPT**

(Scripps News Association)  
 London, July 28—The recent discoveries made by the expedition under the auspices of the British School of Archaeology in Egypt, founded by Prof. Petrie, are of more than ordinary importance and interest. The greater part of the work was done in the land of Goshen in which the Israelites dwelt during their prosperity under the viceroyship of Joseph, and also where, during their bondage they built the store cities for Pharaoh. There was also another problem to be solved. Between 2500 and 1600 B. C. Egypt was overrun by a horde of Asiatic conquerors known as the Hyksos. Having subjugated Egypt, they built a city in the fertile land of Goshen, which they called Avaris. This city has never been discovered, but Prof. Petrie has found the remains of a camp city at Tel-el-Jehudiyah. Another important discovery was the finding of the second store city built by the Israelites and called Ramses. It was identified by its ruins at Tel-el-Retah. The ruins of the temple built by the Jewish high priest Onias, who fled from the persecutions under Antiochus Epiphanes, were found in a mound on the west side of Tel-el-Jehudiyah. Many important and valuable antiquities were unearthed by the exploring party and are now on exhibition at the University College, in this city, where they will remain to the end of the month. The work of the school has been remarkably successful during the past year.

**GENERAL NEWS**

Hirman D. Cook, one of the best known engineers in the employ of the Northern Pacific, has disappeared. He was one of a party of fishers along the Yellowstone river. The party scattered along the stream during the day and Cook failed to appear at the evening roundup, and cannot since be found. It is believed he is drowned.  
 Roadmaster Pete Grant of La Grande division of the O. R. & N., has just returned from an outing in the John Day country.—Pendleton E. O.

The first artesian well in the Rogue river valley has been sunk by Mr. Pellett, near Talent. It is 804 feet deep, 8 1/2 inches in diameter. The water is of excellent quality, very cold, and rises four feet above the surface in a solid stream the full diameter of the bore.—Ex.

**WANT ANOTHER COLUMBIA BRIDGE**  
 A movement has been started by the local business men, backed by prominent politicians in the Yakima valley, to secure an appropriation for a wagon bridge across the Columbia here says the Kennewick Courier. Pasco people are also interested in the project, and will line up their side of the Columbia to a man for the new project. It is evident that two adjacent towns like Pasco and Kennewick will have a constantly increasing travel by road between them.—E. O.

**LAND FOR RAILWAY STATIONS**  
 G. W. Andrews has sold 20 acres of and on the Base Line road to the Oregon Water Power and Railway Company for \$4000. The new branch road now under construction from Cedarville to Troutdale runs along one side of the property, which has a frontage on the Base Line of about 50 rods, and it is reported that the railway company intends to make that point its most important station on the branch road.—Oregon City Courier.

**TRIP. ETS AT OREGON CITY**  
 Mrs. Thomas F. Ryan, wife of ex-county judge of Clackamas county, Tuesday night gave birth to triplets, two girls and a boy. The girls weighed 3 1/2 pounds each and the boy tipped the scale at 4 pounds. The boy died on the following afternoon.  
 Mrs. Ryan is Past Grand Matron of the Order of Eastern Star for Oregon and has a large acquaintance in Elgin and vicinity.—Elgin Recorder.

**FORTY ACRES OF WHEAT BURNED**

Walla Walla July 28—Forty-one acres of wheat were destroyed yesterday about 6 o'clock at the Fred Stine place a short distance from the city.  
 A threshing outfit in an adjoining field had left a small fire from an engine and this was fanned by a light breeze until the stubble was caught and the flames soon spread to the wheat owned by Mr. Stine. The blaze ran through a 200-acre field of fine grain and completely destroyed 41 acres of grain which it is estimated would have made 45 bushels to the acre. That several hundred acres were not destroyed by the flames was due to the neighboring farmers and their crews of harvest hands. In a short time after the blaze had been discovered 70 men were working like Trojans to control it.

**NAVY TO BUILD COLLIERS**

(Scripps News Association)  
 Brooklyn, July 28—By virtue of the increase of the limit of cost allowed by the Naval Appropriation act, work will now be possible on the naval colliers proposed to be built. This increase allows an expenditure of 1,500,000 on each collier, and the work will be done without further delay at the Brooklyn navy yard and the Mare Island Navy Yard. The machinery for the colliers is already under construction here. The colliers will not only carry coal to the ships away from the base of supplies but will be designed so as to transport oil, which is a material as much needed as fuel. Accommodations will also be provided for ammunition and other ordnance stores, and there will be some arrangements for transporting to home ports the sick and wounded officers and men. This latter feature is an important one, and has long been urged as a provision which should be made by the government both in times of peace and war. This latter feature has never been provided for in the past.
