Lime dust, when inhaled, is considered to be the latest cure for consumption. Dr. Bordenave, in a report to the Paris Academy of Medicine, recently stated that within 30 years he has not seen a single case of tuberculosis among the workmen at limekilns, and that people with this disease are soon cured after they live for some time in the lime dust.

ENORMOUS RAILROAD EARNINGS

According to a preliminary report of the interstate commerce commission the gross earnings of the railroads of the United States, covering approximately 219,000 miles of road, will probably show for the fiscal year ended June 30, an increase of 10 per cent over the \$2,073,000,000 earned in 1905. This will prove a banner year for America railroads. The officials figure will not be available for all the roads for some months yet, but the increases that have been shown month after month give reason to expect the ten per cent increase. There have been heavy expenditures for improving roads, but the net earnings will be very favorable.
