Saturday morning the corner stone of the new La Grande National Bank building was placed in position. In this stone was placed the various papers, pictures, documents and coins which were taken from the corner stone of the old building which was removed to make room for the modern building now in course of construction, and also the names of the present stockholders and officers together with copies of the local papers of the county and the leading publications of the state. The corner stone now contains the names of the original officers and stockholders together with the pictures of former cashier J. M. Church and the present staff.

The new building when completed will be one of the finest and most modern banking homes in the state. It will be a structure of which the bank itself may justly feel proud, and one which every citizen of this city may point to with pride. We feel that at this time it is fitting that the picture of the old building, which for years was a landmark of this city, should be published with the picture of the former cashier, Hon. J. M. Church, who for so long held the interests of this city and county so close to his heart, also the pictures of the new building and the present cashier, Mr. F. L. ### SYNOPSIS OF REV. GIBSON'S SERMON

A large number of people of the various church denominations of the city gathered at the Central church last evening for the first of a series of union services which will be held during the coming few weeks. Rev. W. H. Gibson of the Baptist church preached the sermon and took for his text the 12th verse of the 2nd chapter in Isaiah which says: "The desire of all nations shall come."

He said in part: Man has been defined as the thinking animal. Later research justifies an improvement of this definition, and man may be called the religious animal; possibly the worshipping animal this fact out of that truth uttered by Paul in Rome: "The things of Him from the creation of the world are clearly seen, being understood by the things that are made even His eternal power and godhead." Rational man is therefore unsatisfied without some grip upon God. As the heart pants for the brook so pants the soul for God.

The incarnation is God's answer to man's desire for the eternal. It is God in flesh alone that can satisfy soul craving. Preparation for the coming of the Desire of all nations carried many centuries in which sin abounded. Captivity results. Israel weeps in Babylon as she remembers Zion. Haggai the prophet of hope came to rebuke, to encourage. A climax of encouragement came when it was affirmed: "The desire of all nations shall come, and this Jesus Christ, steps out of prophecy into history; out of darkness into light; out of obscurity into radiant glory of the mightiest of the mighty, who with His nail-pierced hand lifts empires off their hinges and turns the tides of history out of their channels. It is He, who satisfies the desire of the rational soul whether of the Red man, Chinese or African. This He does through the fact that in Him dwells all the fullness of the Godhead. Mighty is this universe. Jesus is its creator and love. Power is in His hands. Mightier is the invisible. Only the unseen is eternal. God hath put the eternities into the spirit of Paul, John, Augustine, Shakespear, Luther, Wesley, and Spurgeon. But these mighty men bow in allegiance to Jesus Christ and recognize Him the Alpha and Omega of all. Principalities, powers, thrones and dominions pertain to man, are in man's hand. These pass, man goes on, under Christ goes on forever.

Jesus Christ, the desire of all nations, is founder and force of the religion of redemption. He threw himself as a corner stone beneath this mighty structure and then came forth in resurrection power and glory endowing His religion with omnipotence and the power of an endless life. Has Christianity healed the hurt of nations? Has it bridged the earth with her glory? It is because in it and thro it throbs the power of a divine life.

Christianity therefore is not a dead thing; not a creed, a ceremony, not a display; not even morality touched by emotion. It is that historic movement that took its rise in the heart of God and began its manifestation in Palestine and has extended to earth's remotest bounds, bringing light into darkness; life into death; hope into despair, thro' the dominating power of the sublime personality of Jesus of Nazareth; who by His teachings, renewing grace and living presence, is the very soul of the religion we preach. Christianity is Christ

incarnate, living, inspiring, uplifting and saving men. A French deist came to Talyrand and said: "Sir, I have invented a brand new religion but sad to relate I can get no following." "Ah," said Talyrand, "There is a way to succeed. Get yourself crucified, buried and rise again the third day and ascend unto God and you will get plenty of followers."

Bless God we have gathered at the cross at the empty tomb and beneath our risen and ascending Lord. We know He died for us, He rose for our justification. He ever lives. The desire of nations is He because He gives rest to the weary, He brings ransom for, and liberty to the enslaved. He restores joy to homes spoiled by sin. He bridges the chasm of death and assures of blessed resurrection. Sinner, hear the crying need of your own soul tonight. Receive Jesus, Enthroned Him Lord and Master in your own life. He is the desire of all nations.
