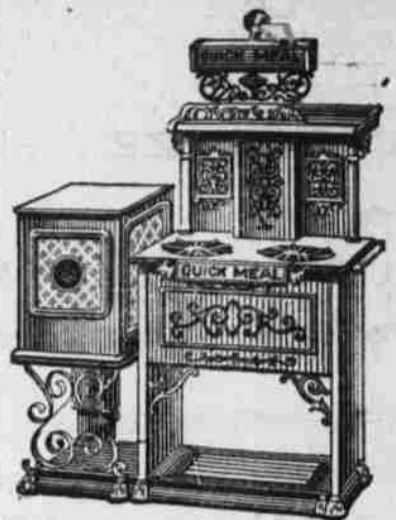

The resources, advantages and investment opportunities of this entire section will be called to the attention of a great many possible investors by means of the Observer's Industrial Edition now being compiled. The works merits and is receiving the material encouragement of progressive citizens.

Jefferson Avenue between Depot and Fir street from Adams Avenue to the railroad crossing should be improved with cement side walks this year.

There is no excuse for the weary pilgrim who may call at your back door for something to eat. There are two or three jobs awaiting anyone who may even suggest a willingness to work.

Geo. Krieger is preparing to make two and one-half million bricks this year. This is many thousand more than has been manufactured in this city since the big fire July 4th, 1890.

Idaho is entering upon her annual state campaign. The contest in the Republican camp is chiefly centered over the re-nomination of Governor Gooding.

While the price of wheat does not start quite as high as it did last year the increased yield will more than offset the difference and the volume of money received, for the 1906 crop will exceed by many thousands of dollars the crop of 1905.

A practical idea of the growth of the fruit industry of this county was foretold in the news columns of this paper yesterday in reporting the sale of the young one hundred acre apple orchard which Messrs. Renshaw and Wilson purchased of M. L. Causey. This tract contains 10,000 trees which in a few years will easily produce six boxes a tree, a total of 60,000 boxes of commercial fruit, which means two train loads of thirty cars, each car containing 600 boxes. Grande Ronde valley will soon be sending solid train loads of fruit to the markets.

Japan continues to be progressive, her last move is the purchase of six railroad lines. There is a growing sentiment in this country that the United States should own and operate several of the transcontinental lines North and South and East and West.

There should be no trouble in securing quite a number of new people if the hardy honest workmen of other sections of the country knew how badly they were need in Union country. The beet, and hay harvest suffered from the lack of suitable help. The A. B. C. Laundry is and has been badly crippled for some time because of the impossibility of securing labor. Geo. Krieger the brick manufacturer is rustling for fifteen or twenty men and thus it is everywhere you go. The railroad contractors want more men all the way from Portland to Wallowa country. We need several hundred laboring men in Union county right now and as the grain harvest commences the demand will be still greater.

Mutiny In Soldier Ranks

Helsingford Russia July 31—The most serious mutiny in the Russian empire since the dissolution of the Douma occurred at Sveaberg. The fortress which guards the harbor of this city and the soldiers ashore are effected by mutiny. Old soldiers of the garrison have been called to quell the mutiny. Soldiers have refused to fire on the soldiers in control of the fleet. People led by socialists are preparing a general strike. Many socialist agitators have gone into the providences to stir up the people.
