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COLORED EDUCATIONAL CONGRESS

 Washington, D. C., July 31.—The national capital has been invaded by more than 10,000 negroes from all sections of the country, principally from the South, who have come here to attend the second quadrennial Negro Young People's Christian and Educational Congress, which opened at Convention Hall today. This congress is the largest and most important gathering of educated negroes ever held in this country since the emancipation of the slaves and a great deal of importance is attached to it throughout the country.

At the opening session of the congress Dr. S. J. Corrothers delivered the introductory address. The Rev. Dr. M. W. D. Norman welcomed the delegates on behalf of the churches; Recorder of Deeds John C. Dancy on behalf of the negro citizens; Commissioner Henry L. West for the District of Columbia, and Secretary Charles J. Bonaparte for the general government. Bishop W. J. Gaines, of the A. M. E. church, will also deliver an address. "A Generation in the Making of a Race and its Results" will be the general theme for discussion at the convention and accord to the program more than two hundred speakers, including some of the most prominent men of both races, will take part in the discussion. Among them will be Booker T. Washington, Bishop G. W. Clinton, the Rev. N. C. Cleaves, Bishop J. W. Arnett, Bishop Alexander Walters and William T. Vernon, the new register of the treasury.

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SPOTTED FEVER IN INTERIOR

Reports come from the interior of two serious cases of the dread spotted fever in the sheep country. One is a young lady school teacher seriously ill at Ironside and the other is a man near unto death at the Lockhart ranch on the road from the lower country to the hills. Both of the patients are in a very serious condition.

Spotted fever seems to be a more prevalent disease this year than ever before in the interior country and the doctors are baffled in treating it. Over there as a general thing the patient is so far from a physician that the disease cannot be properly treated. Everybody is afraid of the dreaded disease and whenever possible they skirt the sage brush plains and stick to the hills or meadows.

It is commonly believed that spotted fever comes from the bite of the sage tick. This tick is red and its bite is very irritating. The common belief among the people of the infested regions is that the tick to carry the germ of the fever to a human must have first been feeding upon a mole and for that reason every effort is made to exterminate the moles. The victim of the spotted fever wastes away slowly, not being alarmingly ill apparently at any time. His skin becomes a blotch of red spots and his flesh dries up.—Baker City Herald.
