Queer Find at Lewiston

While an excavation was being made in the basement of the Raymond house yesterday, the remains of a complete pack outfit were unearthed, evidently a relic of pioneer days. The skeleton of a pack saddle, parts of a small stove, a pair of boots, clothing, bottles, some of which still retained part of their contents, and mule shoes, were among the decayed remains. There were also several bones found in the pack, but these, from all appearances were those of beef. The place where the packing outfit was discovered was about 25 feet below the surface of the street.—Lewiston Tribune.

SOCIETY

Yesterday afternoon Mrs. Roszell gave a pleasant little party in her home in honor of her daughter, Mrs. H. A. Section Foreman Injured

Henry Clay, section foreman at North Powder, had his hand and wrist badly bruised and broken today while loading steel rails at Telocasset. Mr. Clay with a crew of men was lifting the heavy rails to a flat car when one of the rails already on the car fell off. Mr. Clay stepped aside far enough to get his body out of the way but not quick enough to save his hand. The heavy rail caught the fingers in some peculiar manner bending them backwards. The member was also badly cut and bruised.

Walla Walla Fort Doomed

General Funston while stopping at the Portland hotel was interviewed by a reporter for the Bulletin regarding the possibility of the establishment of a brigade post in Walla Walla.

"Impossible," exclaimed the general. "I recommended the abandonment of Fort Walla Walla two years ago, but owing to local pressure on the government the post was retained. Since then new barracks have been built. I do not think it likely that the government will dispose of its present quarters at Walla Walla, but when you speak of a brigade post I can positively state that such a thing is altogether out of the question."

"Where is it likely to be established?" the general was asked.

"At American Lake. There we have 70,000 acres for target practice, unlimited display and maneuver grounds that cannot be surpassed. An acre of that land could be bought at the low figure of \$10 per acre and the government could make no better investment. Walla Walla has no grounds, the roads are so muddy in winter that Colonel Godfrey told me he was unable to exercise his troops during three months. Then again in summer it is too hot altogether, the idea is preposterous. But it does not follow that the present post will be abandoned."

General Greely, also stopping at the Portland, fully agreed with these views and deplored political interference in the military management of this country.—Pendleton E. O.
