**NO MORE
 PASSES ON
 RAILROADS**

Free transportation by virtue of the terms of the new rate bill, recently passed by congress, is practically a thing of the past. The Idaho railroads, carrying out the spirit of the law, have decided to deny all requests for free transportation. Newspapers who have advertising contracts will be given transportation as usual, but even a newspaper man who does not work on a newspaper which has such a contract cannot secure a free pass from one town to another.

The restrictions of the law are being enforced on the Idaho roads even against employees. An Oregon Short Line employe will not be able to travel a mile on Rio Grande transportation as his own line wishes to give him. The law is being enforced particularly against politicians and office holders. Annuals have not been called in because the law does not go into effect until January 1, 1907, but a large number of Idaho people who now carry annuals will have them cut off next New Year's day.

COUNTY COURT

County court is in session today. One of the most important matters to be considered is the matter of county assessment. The supreme court of the state has just handed down a decision that under the constitution there is no authority for exemption. Assessor J. H. Morison desires the county court to pass upon what course he should pursue. The 1906 assessment is almost completed and in accordance with the custom that has been followed for many years, personal property to the amount of \$500 has been deducted. If the decision of the supreme court is followed it will require considerable extra work to make the corrections also additional assessing as the custom has been to make no record of personal property wherein the amount did not exceed the \$300 exemption as allowed by law, until the supreme court declared it void.
