**SALOONS MAY OPEN**

H. B. Royce, proprietor of the Owl saloon in Joseph, Ore., is in the city for a few days, says the Walla Walla Union. Mr. Royce says all the saloons in Walla Walla county have closed but it is expected that they will open again soon, regardless of the fact that the county went dry at the recent election.

By the initiative proceeding under the laws of Oregon, the voters of that state passed a law in June giving the power to incorporated cities and towns of amending their own charters. It is now argued by the liquor men that under this law a city or town may amend its charter and grant license to sell liquor and that the saloons may do business under such license without being subject to prohibition.

By this method the saloon men expect to be able to defeat the local option law and open up for business in the cities that will amend their charters and grant licenses.

**EUROPEAN SENSATIONS**
