The body of Mrs. Sarah P. Cecil still lies unclaimed and unburied at the undertaker's parlors of Welch & Co. He has traced her husband from his former home in Kansas, and the place to which he went after his experience at the whipping post in Baker City, to El Paso, Texas, and there lost track of him. He telegraphed to Cecil's father at Chickashaw, Indian Territory, but received neither reply nor non-delivery of message. So far that he infers that Cecil's parents care nothing about the disposition of the woman's body.

People who knew her ever since she came to this district cannot remember of having ever heard her mention the names of any of her immediate relatives or their addresses.

It seems that after the disgrace which was heaped upon her husband by reason of his being sentenced to the whipping post, for mistreating her, and after she secured her divorce she destroyed every paper that would throw any light upon her past and started out in the world anew, to earn a living for herself and child.

The difficulty encountered in locating any of the dead woman's people is that no one knows what her maiden name was. Some say it was Hayes and some say it was Mercer. The baby which she left is being cared for by friends, but it is naturally supposed that the father and divorced husband or some of her relatives would like to take the child and raise it. —Baker City Herald.

MAY SOLVE ALKALI PROBLEM

North Yakima, Aug. 3.—C. G. Elliott, drainage expert of the United States Agricultural Department, is in Yakima to examine lands that have been "taken" by alkali. He will also investigate the drainage work that has been done in the valley. The agricultural department is co-operating with communities and individuals with a view to solving the question of "alkali" lands. Experiments were conducted here three years ago by Mr. Elliott, and it is his purpose to continue them during the coming year.

The greatest problem in the Yakima Valley is not how to get enough water to irrigate the land, but how to get rid of it after it has once soaked into the ground.

MUCH LONGER RUN

Among other things that will tend to make business good in Pendleton this fall is the fact that the scouring mill is to make a much longer run this year than usual, thereby keeping a force of over 50 men at work during the summer and fall.
