Mr. Gekeler was immediately rendered unconscious. Fortunately two experienced linemen happened to be working within a few feet of Mr. Gekeler, cutting away some of the trees which grew in front of his residence so that there would be no danger from this source. Messrs. H. V. Swan and R. C. Gunn, who immediately commenced to restore respiration and before a physician could be summoned Mr. Gekeler had partially regained consciousness. His hand was badly burned and had he not been standing upon some dry gravel he would have been instantly killed. This morning he noticed that the bottoms of his feet were slightly blistered. It was a very close call.

THE PASSING OF W. H. BARNES

DIED—W. M. Barnes aged seventy-nine years in this city yesterday morning of hemorrhage of the stomach.

Mr. Barnes was born in Ohio January 30, 1827 and at the age of five years he with his parents moved to Kansas.

Here he was united in marriage to Miss E. M. Tuley and after short time she died leaving a family of three who survive the father. Seventeen years ago he came to this county and has made his home with his daughter, Mrs. Tom Short of this city.

Deceased was a member of the G. A. R. having served three years in the Civil war and was honorably discharged at the close of that struggle. While in the service he was a participant of many of the great struggles. He fought at Gettysburg, at Franklin and saw many skirmishes in the Shenandoah, and was with Sherman in his memorable march to the sea, but was detailed for other duty before the end of the march.

He had enjoyed good health up to the time of his death and his passing away was a sudden shock. Saturday afternoon he walked from the Short home on the North side to town and returned some time about half past five. A few minutes after six a neighbor saw him lying in the back yard and hastily went to his assistance. He found the old soldier bleeding from the mouth and it was surmised that he had fallen and injured himself internally. He was taken to the house and after a careful surgical examination had been made it was evident that he was suffering from a bad hemorrhage.

Yesterday morning at ten minutes after ten o'clock M. W. Barnes passed away.

Three children, Mrs. Tom Short of this city, J. E. Barnes of Snake River and Mrs. Eva Allan of Kansas survive him. Neither of the absent ones were present at the funeral which was held this afternoon from the Short residence. Rev. J. D. Gillilan officiating.

For these many years Mr. Barnes has been an honored and respected citizen of La Grande and leaves behind him a host of friends to mourn his death. Always genial and pleasant, he formed many friends and those who knew him grew to admire him more as the acquaintance matured.
