UMATILLA MAN HAS HARD LUCK

Pendleton, Or., Aug. 9.—Through spontaneous combustion, caused by threshing smutty wheat, Budd Nelson, a Wild Horse Creek farmer has lost two threshing machines during the present harvesting season. The former of the machines was burned several weeks ago, and a new Niagara thresher, which he had just purchased to replace the burned one, was destroyed shortly after being started up at the same setting.

In both instances the threshers were set afire by explosions in the cylinder, the same being presumably caused by smutty wheat. The former machine was valued at \$600, while the second one cost \$1400 and was insured for \$900.

Springfield, Mo., August 9.—The trial of the men charged with the lynching of several negroes here several months ago began today. Soon after the trial was begun, J. L. Maxey, one of the regular panel of jurors, received word that his house, 15 miles west of Springfield, had been struck by lightning, his two children killed and the house destroyed. He was excused from further service.

FOOT CUT OFF BY COMBINE

While oiling a combined harvester on the farm of J. H. Raulstone near Adams, this morning, Henry Precard, the well known threshing machine man of this county, met with an injury which may result in the loss of his left foot.

While oiling he stepped on the gearing of the machine and the team started to run, catching his foot in the cogs and cutting in a horrible manner. All the toes and a large part of the foot was cut and mashed off and if any of the member is saved it will be badly crippled.

Mr. Precard narrowly escaped death as the team ran about 80 yards dragging him under the machine.
