MILITIA ENTRAIN TONIGHT

Tonight when passenger train number five pulls into the station, Company L will be ready to board for American Lake.

Great things are planned for the militia this year and the militia from Oregon, Washington, Idaho and Wyoming will be instructed in all the different phases of warfare. Fifteen million rounds of blank ammunition will be at their disposal for sham battles. This is a new venture of the northwest states' guard and much interest in the outcome of the maneuvers is manifest.

The local company, about forty-five strong, will be thoroughly equipped for camp life. Each soldier carries in his blanket roll, one pair of shoes, one change of underwear, a comb and brush, three pairs of stockings, and a poncho, besides the cooking utensils in the haversack which includes a tin plate, knife, fork, spoon and a cup. All will wear the sombre shirt and kaki uniform. Officers will be attired in Olive drab.
