TELLER OF CHICAGO DEFUNCT BANK SUICIDED LAST NIGHT

(Scripps News Association)
Chicago, Aug. 11.—While the coroner was holding an inquest this morning over the body of Frank Kowalski, the teller of the Milwaukee Avenue State bank, who committed suicide last night, a crowd of angry neighbors, mostly foreigners, gathered about the house and created a demonstration. A Polish man and woman entered the house and hurled anathemas at the family and shook their fists at the body and cursed the memory of the young man. The crowds tore the wreaths and crepe from the door and crushed them in the gutter. The excitement had grown to a riot when the police subdued it with clubs. Kowalski was driven to suicide by the taunts of the neighbors who thought he should have warned them of coming failure. Examiner Jones says there is no evidence that he had the

slightest knowledge of the conditions of the bank. The police have an unconfirmed report that Stensland has gone to Fort Worth and enroute traveled with a Chicagoan. The frontier is being watched.
PAUL STENSLAND IN TEXAS
Fort Worth, Tex., Aug. 11.—Paul Stensland, the absconding president, according to a statement of Henry Adams, former commissioner and broker of Chicago, is on his way to Mexico. Adams says that he came all the way from New Orleans to this city with the former banker, during the conversation he asked Stensland how the bank was progressing. Stensland replied that it had never been in better condition and was prosperous. Stensland stated that when he left Fort Worth, he was going on a Mexican pleasure trip but needed rest before going farther.

HARLEM YACHT CLUB'S RACE

New York, Aug. 11.—More than a dozen yachts started this morning in the second annual long distance race under the auspices of the Harlem Yacht club. The course started from a line indicated by a white flag on the committee's boat and a mark boat anchored about a quarter of a mile south of Belden Point, City Island, to and around Middle Group Light, Stratford Shoal, leaving same to port; then back to the starting line, a distance of sixty-eight nautical miles. The race is for cabin yachts, in cruising trim of 33 feet racing measurements or less and enrolled in any recognized club. Two prizes will be awarded; one to the yacht making the best corrected time and one to the yacht making the second best time.

LOSES LIFE TO SAVE FRIENDS

New York, Aug. 11.—Michael O'Conner ignited a fuse in the Pennsylvania tunnel and it burned too quick. He told the workmen of the accident and instructed them to run for their lives. He went back to gather in the stray workmen but the explosion caught him, killing him instantly. He saved scores of lives, only one man being injured.

SWIMMING AT TRAVERS ISLAND

New York, August 11.—The third set of swimming races under the auspices of the New York Athletic Club is being held at Travers Island today. The events include a 440 yards swim, handicap; a 100-yard swim, notice; a diving contest and a 100-yards swim for the Metropolitan A. A. U. championship. Gold, silver and bronze medals will be awarded to first, second and third respectively.

THE CRUISER ST. LOUIS

Philadelphia, Pa., Aug. 11.—The cruiser St. Louis which was built by the firm of Neale & Levy is ready to be turned over to the Government. The firm went into the hands of a receiver while building the ship, but the work was continued and the cruiser was completed. The St. Louis will be commanded by Commander N. R. Usher.

TROOPS USE REAL SHELLS FOR BLANKS

St. Petersburg, August 11.—Grand Duke Nicholas narrowly escaped assassination yesterday at the hands of the Imperial guard at Camp Kransnoyelski. The grand duke had been conducting maneuvers and putting his troops through blank firing when suddenly bullets began to hiss about his head. Neither the horse nor rider was touched. He commanded the troops to cease firing and the regiments marched back to camp. Many arrests have been made from the regiments which sent the real bullets in an attempt to take the duke's life. The accident theory is shouted and the incident has caused immediate changes in the plans in the Emperor who had planned to attend the camp next week.

POORER CLASS WANT REVOLUTION

El Paso, Tex., Aug. 11.—"If there is no revolution in Mexico it is not because the entire lower class does not wish for one," said R. L. Bates, a business man of Cananea, now in this city. He left Cananea, Mexico, for good, being threatened with death if he did not. Col. Greene has five searchlights and galling guns and a stable full of arms in preparation for trouble. He says that one hundred and thirty Mexicans have been killed and nine ring leaders hanged.

STENSLAND HEADS GANG OF FORGERS

BOZEMAN'S BIG CARNIVAL

Bozeman, Mont., Aug. 11.—Bozeman's big carnival for which preparations had been going on for several weeks, opened this morning with a grand industrial parade. The Queen of the Carnival rode on a beautifully decorated float and all vehicles were decorated with flowers. Prizes will be awarded to the best turnouts. In the afternoon there will be a mass meeting with Governor Toole as the principal speaker. Then the Queen will be crowned. In the evening there will be a grotesque parade and mummery, combined with a flower and confetti battle. There will also be two balls.

VETERANS' CYCLE RUN

New York, August 11.—The bicycle riders of Greater New York have arranged to have a two-days outing, to be known as the Eighth Annual Century Veterans' Run. The same plan followed last year proved so popular that a repetition was decided upon. The wheelmen, more than one hundred in number, will start from here by boat for Sag Harbor this afternoon and will ride from Sag Harbor to Jamaica tomorrow. Another division of cyclists will start from here tomorrow morning and will ride out to meet the other cyclists at Patchogue, the fifty-mile stop. Medals will be awarded to all who complete the 100-mile run.

WILL CONJURE SPIRITS IN CAMP

MANOEUVERS WITHOUT SIGNALS

Washington, D. C., Aug. 11.—The plans for the extensive maneuvers of the North Atlantic fleet are almost completed. Before fall Admiral Evans will have a fleet of sixteen battleships, which will be the largest fleet of effective vessels ever assembled at one time by the United States. A new feature is to be introduced in the maneuvers this year, and the ships are to practice evolution without signals, in order to meet emergencies in battle when owing to smoke or when signal apparatuses have been shot away, signals can no longer be given.

PROFESSOR WILDER 65 YEARS OLD

Ithaca, N. Y., August 11.—Prof. Burt G. Wilder, the brain expert, who has taught physiology and zoology at Cornell ever since the university was opened in 1858, is celebrating his 65th birthday today. Only two months ago Prof. Wilder, then a widower, married Miss Mary Field, daughter of Mrs. Mary Burd Field of Boston. Miss Field was a graduate of Mount Holyoke College and was a pupil of Prof. Wilder in 1874, when he lectured at the Anderson Summer School of Natural History on Penikese Island.

CORINTHIANS PLAY IN MONTREAL

Montreal, Que., August 11.—The Corinthian "Soccer" football team, composed of crack English football experts, will play their first Canadian game of this season in this city today. As were the Pilgrims last year the Corinthians are under the captainship of Fred H. Milnes. After leaving Montreal the English players will go to Ottawa, where they expect to play on Monday, thence to Hamilton, where they will play on Wednesday. They will also play in Toronto, Berlin and London, whence they will go direct to Chicago, to begin their tour through the United States.

OPENING POLO SEASON AT NEWPORT

William Bryan arrived here today and arranged for a day of sight seeing. His attention was called to the workmen's pension law and day of rest.

Bryan was the guest of Francis at luncheon today. They discussed the democratic reforms and the coming campaign issues. Colonel Moses Wetmore and Millard Dunlap were guests also. It is understood that the political standing of Sullivan and Taggart was also discussed.

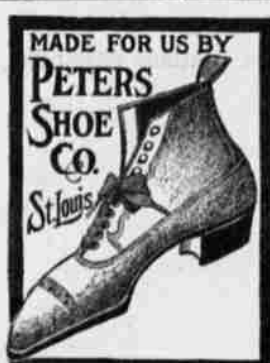
